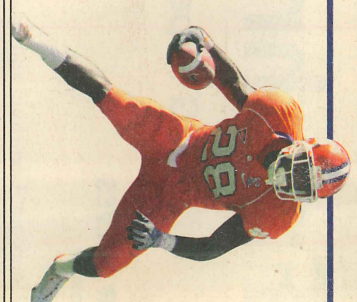

## Presidents address the issues

State of the University address projects plans to combat economic crisis.

Three of Clemson's most influential leaders took the stage Tuesday night for the State of the University address held at the Strom Thurmond Institute. University President James Barker along with Undergraduate and Graduate Student Body presidents Callie Boyd and Jason Schwier discussed Clemson's current concerns and progress, as well as actions being taken to combat what looks to be a troubled financial future.

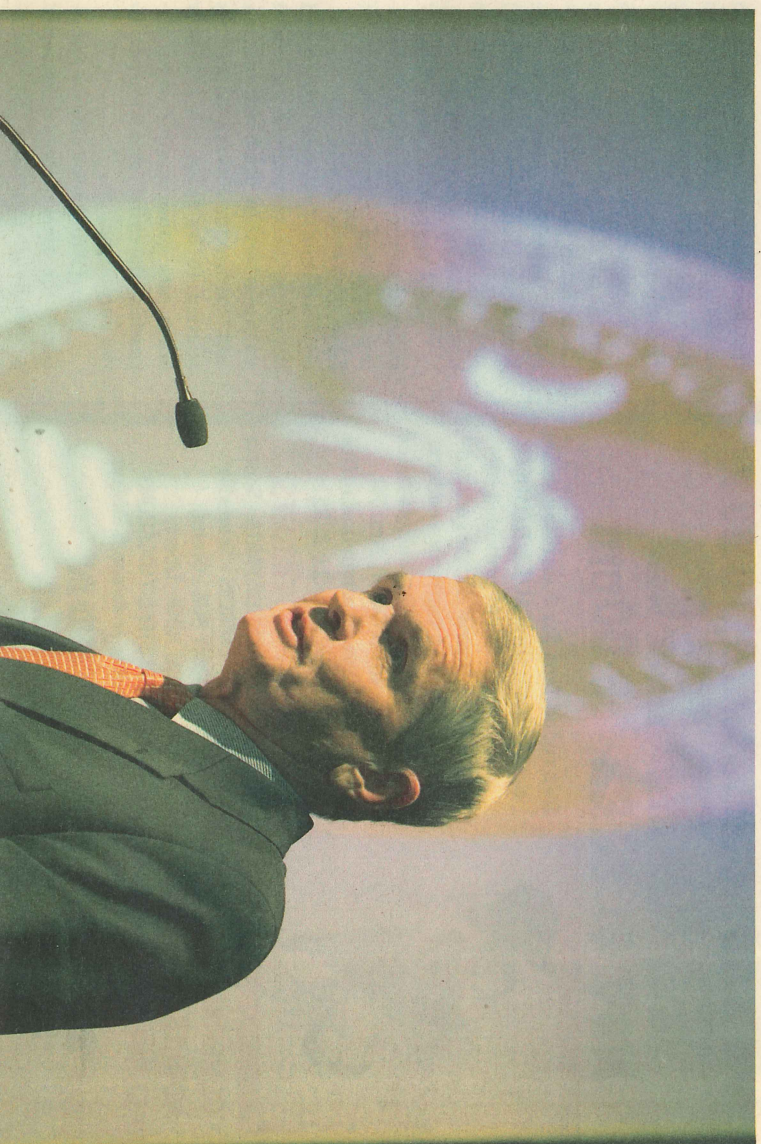
Callie Boyd began by recognizing the severity of current economic strains on the University, citing the \$25 million in state budget cuts. Boyd then called upon the State General Assembly to realize the value and necessity of higher education, proposing the utilization of revenue-generating sources, such as a higher cigarette tax, rather than reducing higher education funding. To promote this vision, Boyd will be hosting lobbying trips in the spring to Columbia, where she and other concerned students will work to voice the concerns and ideas of Clemson's student body.

In addition to laying the framework for action against the economic crisis, Boyd commented on the recent Clemson Undergraduate Student Government

(CUSG) review of student fees and their designated purposes. She highlighted two particular fees, the student library and transit fees, that previously were not explicitly defined. The former, a \$50 payment that excludes freshmen and graduate students, has gone towards improving and upholding the quality of research and library assistance students receive. Also, material upgrades have been made to the library thanks to those fees, including an increase in the number of electrical outlets in the library and a fully functioning air conditioning system.

Finally, Boyd acknowledged the accomplishments of the CUSG throughout this semester, such as increased campus security, improved student advising and the embracement of diversity on campus.

Jason Schwier, Graduate Student Body president, spoke on behalf of the 3,600 graduate students at Clemson. He began by outlining the recent gains of the Graduate School, such as reaching the \$150 million mark in research funding and having a record number of Fulbright scholars. The graduate student government has succeeded in raising \$40,000 in professional enrichment grants and significantly improving the healthcare plan for graduate students.

Schwier then supported the work and protection of Clemson's 1,800 graduate assistants, noting the need to protect the University from underperforming graduate assistants while also

shielding assistants from exploitation by faculty and administrators. According to Schwier, graduate students at Clemson are paid an average of \$5,000 less per year than at peer

institutions. This number could detract students from choosing Clemson for their graduate experience, not only for-

## Students engage

NSSE highly ranks student involvement.

According to recent survey results, University students should be proud of their Clemson education.

The findings, from the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE), showed that those surveyed feel Clemson provides a level of education superior to that of its fellow institutions.

The annual report measures satisfaction among freshmen and seniors and is administered by the University via e-mail each spring.

This year, Clemson students said they are taught in an intellectually stimulating environment and are given opportunities to work with professors and other students in non-traditional classroom settings.

Students also said they feel the University is committed to helping them succeed.

The NSSE includes a review of how students perceive Clemson supports them in the categories of academic challenge, active and collaborative learning, student-faculty interactions, enriching educational experiences and supportive campus environment.

After comparing Clemson's results against those from other national doctoral-extensive universities, the NSSE found Clemson scored better than peer universities in most of the categories and at least as well in the others.

"The results indicate that Clemson is on the right track in

many areas that matter to students," said Debra B. Jackson, University vice provost and assistant to the president.

Ninety-three percent of the freshmen who responded gave Clemson a favorable evaluation, and 91 percent of seniors said they would choose Clemson again if they could restart their college career.

More than 1,100 randomly chosen students participated in the survey.

Eighty-nine percent of freshmen also said they feel that Clemson strongly emphasizes academics and reported that the University is invested in their success.

Jackson said she hopes the results will show not only what Clemson has succeeded in doing, but also what Clemson can improve on to ensure students have the best possible educational experience.

"Using the results we can determine where we need to place emphasis or make changes to improve students' opportunities at Clemson," said Jackson.

"We have used the NSSE results to improve student engagement."

Past NSSE surveys have led to the creation of Clemson's creative inquiry (CI) projects to foster engagement between students and faculty and to improve students' problem solving and critical thinking skills.

The success of the CI program has allowed students to submit their

## Athletes add to registry

Alpha Sigma Phi sponsors bone marrow registry.

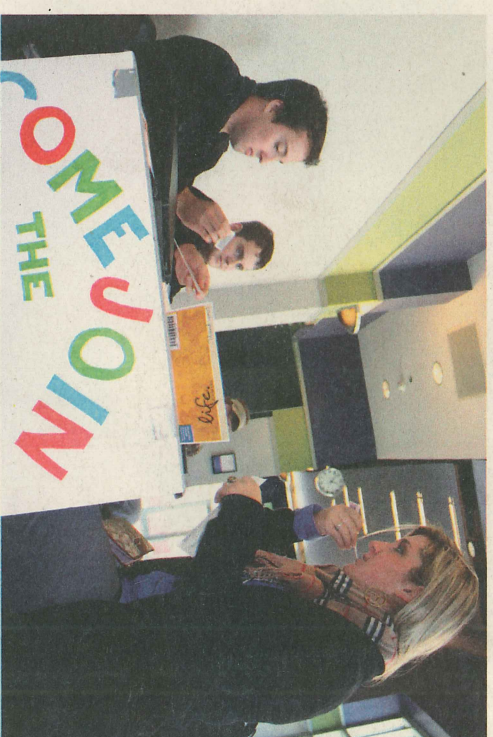

After football practice Wednesday and Thursday this week, Clemson football players registered with the National Bone Marrow Donor Registry. The team went through the process in the team locker room in the Jervey Athletic Center, which consisted of four mouth swabs and filling out a form to join the registry.

The idea to get the entire team registered originated by founding member of Alpha Sigma Phi fraternity Trey Robinson. The idea occurred to Robinson while leaving chapter one night when asked if roommate and football player Aaron Kelly would register.

"Alpha Sigma Phi is a relatively new fraternity on campus, and I wanted to do something that would not only get our name out on campus but would affect the most people possible," said Robinson. Through Kelly, Robinson was able to get in contact with new coach, Dabo Swinney. Swinney quickly agreed to the suggestion and within two days of proposing his idea, Robinson was sitting in Swinney's office, discussing the setup of the bone marrow registry.

The National Marrow Donor Program is a non-profit organization that aims to connect needy patients with bone marrow or umbilical cord blood donors for transplants. According to the National Marrow Donor Program, 70 percent of peo-

ple with life-threatening diseases like leukemia and lymphoma will not find a matched donor within their family, which is when the program comes in.

Since the program began connecting patients and donors in 1987, the registry has grown to its current size of seven million donors and 70,000 cord blood units.

When one registers with the program, his or her information is transmitted to the registry, from where the National Bone Marrow Donor Program will contact registered volunteer donors if they are matched with a searching patient.

"The mother of one of our advisors died because she could not find a bone marrow match," said Robinson.

"We want to raise money for this project and also increase awareness about the bone marrow donor registry."

Expecting a small turnout from the football team due to the demanding schedules of the athletes, Robinson was pleasantly surprised to have 50 players come out — approximately half the team. "It was truly inspirational to see these guys that many people watch every Saturday sit down to sign up to possibly help the fans who support them or someone they don't even know," said Robinson.

Anyone who did not get the chance to visit the registry, which was in the Hendrix Center from Monday, Nov. 17 to Thursday, Nov. 20, can register online at [www.marrows.org](http://www.marrows.org).

"It is important to register because as human beings I feel we have some obligation to help others," said Robinson. "It is not always convenient or easy to do, but I feel the Bone Marrow Registry is an easy way to help others."

# Freshman visitation policy rethought

CUSG hopes to extend the current visitation hours in freshman dorms across campus.

It's 2 a.m. in Clemson, and a steady stream of students are making the trek back to their respective dorms.

Visiting hours, an annoyance for many freshmen, are over.

However, these students may soon find themselves with some extra time thanks to the efforts of some Student Government Senate members.

The Undergraduate Student Government is looking to change the current visitation policy for freshman dorms in reaction to

research conducted by the Senate Campus Life Committee on the visitation policies of Top 20 and ACC institutions.

According to the committee, Clemson's current housing policy is less "liberal" in comparison to its counterparts such as Georgia Tech and the University of California who have no visitation policies in place.

These findings, along with negative student feedback about the current policy, roused the committee to introduce a new policy proposal to the Director of Housing Dr. Doug Hallenbeck.

Following the decision to form a proposal, Campus Life Committee Chair Brian Jones and fellow committee members met with the Residence Hall Association (RHA) and the Housing Department to begin drafting a new policy.

"RHA suggested a more 'liberal' policy than the final one, and housing suggested a stricter version of RHA proposal," said Jones.

Visitation policies are based largely upon communal bathroom arrangements in freshman dorms, and "bathroom privacy issues," as referred to by Jones, were heavily taken into consideration while discussing potential amendments to the current policy.

Along with various minor alterations, the final proposal included a one-hour extension on visitation hours from Monday through Thursday (10 a.m. to 3 a.m.) and the elimination of visitation hours during the weekend.

Many students expressed a desire

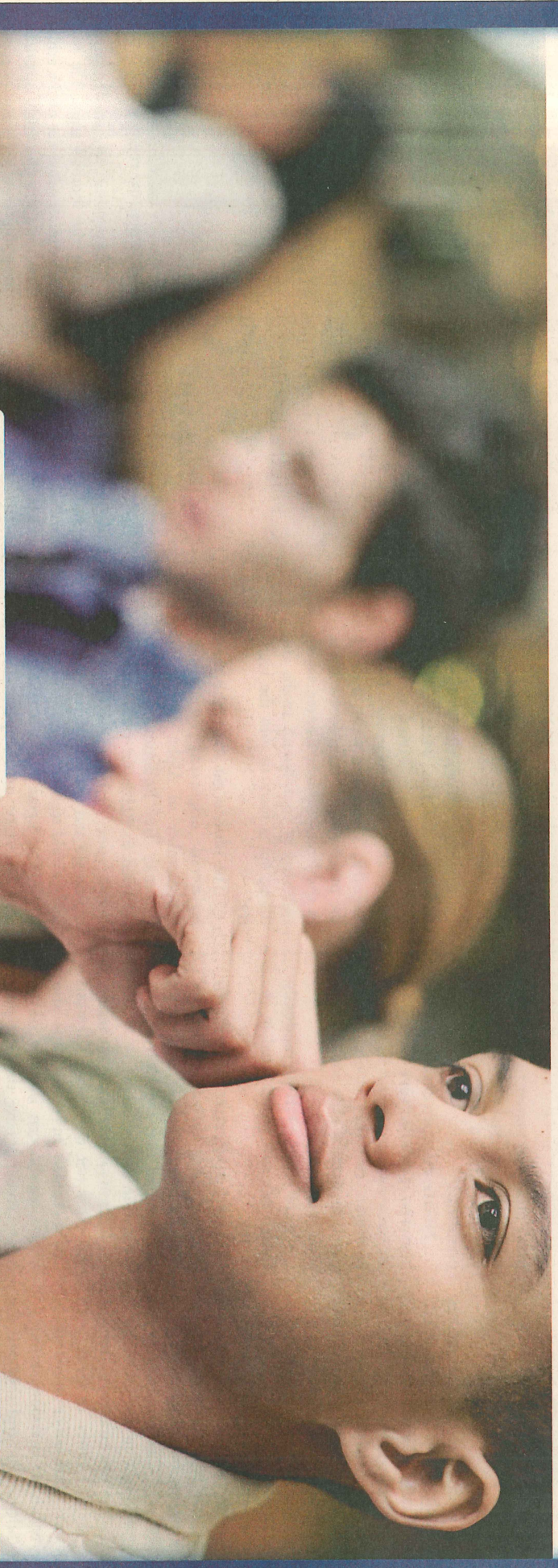

# Festival held to save organic farm

## Student for Environmental Awareness combat budget cuts

With recent cuts to Clemson's budget and the expiration of their state funded grant, the Students for Environmental Awareness (SEA) will hold their first Farm Aid Festival to raise money to save Clemson's Student Organic Farm.

It costs approximately \$75,000 a year to run the farm, most of which was funded by USDA grants. The severe drop in funding this year caused the farm to layoff one full-time and two part-time workers. "The farm took drastic budget hits this year and needs the community's help to persist into the next season, until funding can return," said Blake Storey, an active member of SEA.

The Student Organic Farm was certified as organic in 2005 and has been growing vegetables and plants ever since. Only last year, officials opened up the farm to selling on site as opposed to bring the goods to a market.

The Farm Aid Festival is not anticipating the salvation of the farm through one fundraiser, but they do hope that the word will

spread about the situation. "We don't expect to make a lot of money, just enough hopefully to get the farm through the winter," said Blake. "The primary focus is to bring the community together to celebrate local agriculture and help us gain support from the University's administration in their budgets and from competitive grants."

This festival will have live music, speakers, fun activities for the kids and a selection of fresh food from vendors from around the Clemson community. The farm is across from the football stadium on Perimeter Road. If heading toward U.S. 76 take the first right onto Old Stadium Road after passing through the Williamson Road stoplight. The farm's gravel driveway is on the right. It will begin at 10 a.m. and run until 4 p.m. on Nov. 22.

**President-elect Barack Obama appoints Hillary Clinton Secretary of State.**

Obama's advisors have ended the search to fill this position. Clinton and Obama were said to have met secretly in Chicago on Thursday to discuss the matter.

Word went out quickly and spread amongst many Democrats who concur with the decision.

While no formal announcement was made in the past week, many politicians such as John Kyl of Arizona and Henry Kissinger made statements about Hillary's new role and wholeheartedly agree with Obama for choosing her.

In the presidential primaries, Clinton expressed many of the same views on foreign policy as Obama; however, there is speculation she and Vice President-elect Joe Biden may cross paths, as he is interested in foreign policy as well.

The other prospects considered for the role included Gregory Craig, Gov. Bill Richardson of New Mexico, and Sen. John Kerry.

**More than 800 residences have been destroyed due to an extensive wildfire in southern California.**

The fire started Thursday, Nov. 13 and extended from Santa Barbara to southeast Los Angeles.

It spread due to the Santa Ana winds and dry climate California notorious for.

The actual cause of the fire has not been identified.

The houses destroyed range from multi-million dollar mansions to modest, mobile homes and more than 50,000 evacuation orders have been issued since Thursday.

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger has officially declared a state of emergency in the fire-afflicted areas.

More than 3,700 firefighters battled the raging inferno from helicopters, bulldozers and engines across the state.

While there have been no reports of missing persons, 11 were injured.

This fire has been considered to be the worst fire seen in California in nearly 50 years.

Some evacuated residents told reporters they aren't sure if the fire has affected their homes or if they have been completely destroyed.

**Environmentalists are furious about talk of expansion of cell phone use and installation of wireless Internet in Yellowstone National Park.**

Officials recently released a plan to allow for a few more cell phone towers and wireless Internet installations in some of the park's hotels, much to many environmentalists' dismay. The plan would leave the backcountry and most roads untouched.

Many people are disappointed in the decision and say seeing people talking on the phone ruins the experience of the nation's oldest national park. Most see visiting the park as a way to "unplug" from the real world.

While there are many against the new plan, some visitors don't see a problem with it.

With the added convenience of Internet access people could come back and research the bison they saw that day or share new pictures on Facebook.

Yellowstone officials say it is only logical to have Internet, access in the more developed areas of the park. "Yellowstone is not one place," said Tom Ollitt, the park official who oversaw the plan.

"It's three to four different experiences. The developed areas have a different experience than anywhere else

**Chinese President Hu Jintao seeks to advance economic ties with Cuba.**

President Hu visited Cuba for the second time since 2004 to strengthen trade between the two countries. China speculates it will form connections with other Central and South American countries as well, such as Costa Rica and Peru.

While communist governments run both China and Cuba, the two economies follow very different economic models.

However, Raul Castro, Fidel Castro's younger brother and president of Cuba, is beginning to reform the old economic model and fashion it towards China's.

Costa Rica as well hopes to begin new ties with China. After 60 years of relations with Taiwan, Costa Rica cuts ties in order to form diplomatic relations with China.

The Chinese see Taiwan as a breakthrough province and thus refuse to associate with countries that have ties to the country.

The Costa Rican officials admit they made this move to attract Chinese investment.

President Hu also plans to visit Peru and attend the Apec (Asia-Pacific Economic Co-operation) summit in Lima on Nov. 21 and 22.

**Muslims and police clash in a violent demonstration at polls in Kashmir.**

The state elections took place Monday, Nov. 17 despite the Muslim separatists' blockades at polling stations.

Police dispersed the demonstrators after hours of protesting against Indian rule and shouting anti-election slogans in the voting district of Bandipore.

Kashmir is located between Pakistan and India, both of which claim the territory and have left more than 43,000 dead in the long, bloody separatist campaign.

The elections followed much protest by both separatist Muslims who fear that the state elections will strengthen Indian control of the state as well as Indian nationalists who are afraid the separatist Muslims will gain control of the Himalayan state.

The elections were held to select representatives to take care of local needs like roads, water and the power supply.

More than 47 percent of voters turned out in Bandipore and 55 percent of voters turned out in seven other voting areas without major protests.

**Owners hope to take control of Saudi supertanker after a pirate hijacking.**

In the past year, more than 88 ships have been seized by pirates off the Somalian coast, and the number keeps rising.

The pirates who captured the Saudi vessel are making their way to Somalia, giving hope to the supertanker's owners that negotiations will soon take place.

The vessel is believed to contain approximately \$100 million worth of crude oil and hold 25 crewmembers.

Negotiations in the past for circumstances such as these usually include the owner paying a ransom ranging from \$500,000 to \$2 million.

While piracy is no surprise to most ship owners who ply these waters, officials are stunned to see the range of which this particular piracy occurred.

Authorities link this expansion to increased naval patrols in the Gulf of Aden and in the Arabian Sea.

As for the 25 crew members on the ship, the owner wants a smooth transition to get the sailors home safely and as quickly as possible.

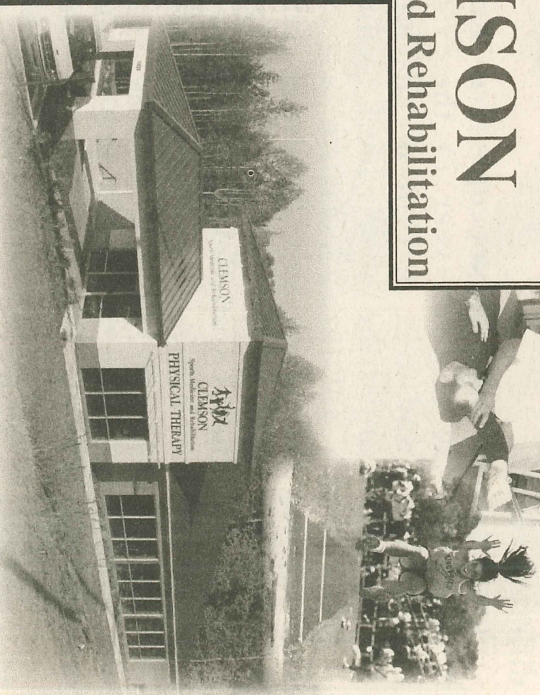

## EYE ON CRIME

This week's eye on crime focuses on the owner of the Dallas Mavericks basketball team. Mark Cuban was charged with insider trading of Mamma.com Inc., a Quebec-based Internet search engine firm.

The owner allegedly sold his entire stake to avoid \$750,000 in losses with non-public information.

Although the deed was done in late June 2004, the Securities and Exchange Commission made a statement concerning the accusation on Monday, Nov. 17.

According to the SEC, Mamma.com invited Cuban to take part in a private placement stock offering only after he agreed to keep the information top secret. Later, when Cuban found that the offering would weaken the holdings of existing shareholders and would sell cheaper than the market price, he became livid and made a phone call to his broker to sell the stock.

Cuban denies these accusations, saying in his blog "The matter has no merit and is the result of gross abuse of prosecutorial discretion."

project findings for publication, research posters and national presentations.

According to Jackson, the NSSE results are currently being examined to reveal what areas Clemson needs to make progress.

Among the improvements already being considered are those that target advising, student-faculty research, technologically enhanced classrooms, the inclusion of diversity in undergraduate curriculum, student and staff interactions and increased participation in study abroad.

"For example, one area of weakness was having serious conversations with students of another race or ethnicity," said Jackson.

To address this, Clemson's Office of Student Affairs introduced a performance measure to provide more opportunities for students to meet and discuss with others

feiting talented researchers for the University but also future donors.

Schwier predicted an increase in graduate applications due to the current economic crisis and suggested a revamp in the graduate experience to attract these new students to Clemson's master and doctoral programs.

He proposed more collaborative projects and group or team work to simulate real life experience in the work force.

Schwier ended by calling upon the graduate student body to embrace the student athletes at Clemson, acknowledging the Graduate Student Government's efforts to promote school spirit on campus and to make their voices heard among the student population.

President Barker began his speech by praising the endeavors of Clemson's faculty, staff and student body towards making the University a Top 20 institution, and he proceeded to point out many of Clemson's other notable accomplishments such as being ranked the number one place to work in academia by The Scientist magazine.

Compared to its 2001 statistics, Clemson has made huge strides in academic development — going from a 39th ranking to the 22nd spot, improving the graduation rate by 7 percent and almost doubling the University's Ph.D. enrollment. This year's freshman class was of the highest academic caliber ever to enter the University, exhibiting Clemson's rise in the academic

arena.

Barker expressed high hopes for Clemson in the next five years, outlining the specific goals of being ranked within the Top 20 public universities, increasing South Carolina's prosperity, solving current societal problems and distinguishing Clemson as a reputable institution of higher learning.

The president also addressed the struggle for funding that is creating much anxiety among the Clemson community.

He outlined strategies to mitigate the effect of the economic downfall that included eliminating vacant and temporary positions, eliminating unnecessary travel, replacing one-time funds with recurring dollars and increasing the University's revenues.

Both the Graduate and Undergraduate Student Governments have assembled task forces to brainstorm and aid administrators with these implementations.

Barker also noted the required five-day furlough for all faculty members next semester and encouraged contributions to the newly established furlough relief fund.

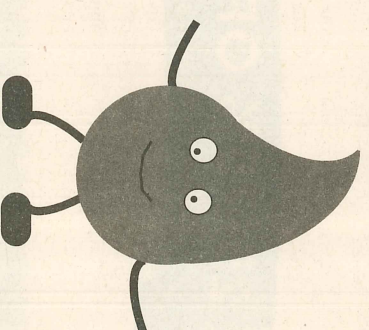
Following his speech, President Barker engaged students in a question and answer segment during which he was asked his opinion on issues such as housing, student fees and even football.

All three presidents carried out the purpose of the first State of the University address in further informing Clemson's student body about the current and future focuses of the governing bodies.

# Eleventh sorority added to Greek order

Panhellenic Council votes to initiate Sigma Kappa as its newest member.

Panhellenic Council voted Wednesday night to bring an 11th sorority, Sigma Kappa, to Clemson.

The final decision was narrowed down to Sigma Kappa, Alpha Phi and Pi Beta Phi.

Recruitment for Sigma Kappa will begin with an informal session in the spring. Formal recruitment will take place in Fall 2009 with the other 10 sororities.

The decision to extend an invitation to an additional sorority was based on the 2008 Panhellenic recruitment season, according to August Darnell, vice president of Clemson University's College Panhellenic Council. This fall, more than 700 women signed up to participate, more than ever before. This level of interest in Greek life made the Panhellenic Council consider adding another organization.

The extension process began with the formation of a committee. Representatives of all 10 Panhellenic chapters are a part of the committee, including advisors, chapter presidents and the Panhellenic Executive Board. Any Panhellenic chapter in the United States not currently represented at Clemson University was provided the chance to send information, visit the University and send packets to be reviewed for extension.

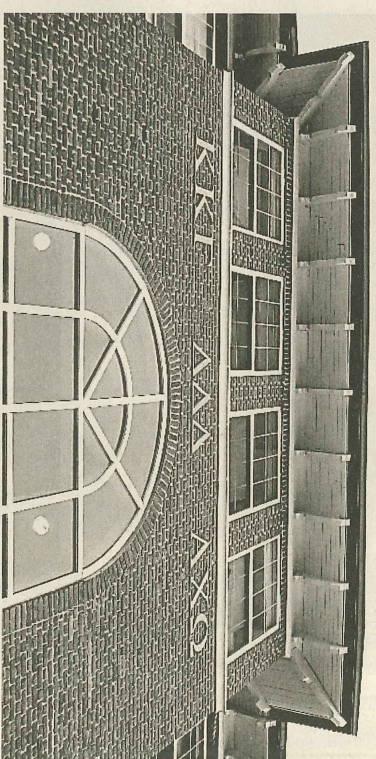
The extension committee reviewed the information provided by the potential organizations. The committee then decided to invite three to travel to Clemson, S.C., and present why the board should consider them to be the next sorority on campus.

The visits by Sigma Kappa, Alpha Phi and Pi Beta Phi included meeting administrators, chapter presidents, the extension committee and the Panhellenic Executive Board. It also included an open presentation with a question and

answer session. The extension committee met on Tuesday and presented its decision to the Panhellenic Council. The council decided Wednesday to pass the committee's recommendation, providing female students with another sorority to consider joining.

This decision allows Sigma Kappa to begin initial plans for recruitment and colonization in the spring. The sorority must meet all requirements set forth by Clemson Undergraduate Student Government (CUSG) to become a recognized organization. According to Patrick Becker, CUSG organization director, the group of students interested in bringing this group to campus will need to fill out the online recognition form, create a constitution and set up a recognition meeting.

When asked about the length of time required to become a new organization, Becker said, "It all depends upon when College Panhellenic Council turns in the application. As soon as it's turned

in, it should be less than one week."

The organization must also fill and maintain the requirements of an organization under the Panhellenic Council.

Leadership positions for Sigma Kappa will be determined at the latest by Spring 2008. Housing for the sorority is already in the works. Darnell

said a space is available in Smith Hall, currently being used to accommodate freshman women.

"Being able to extend shows great strength in our Panhellenic Council and Greek Life as a whole, and I feel privileged to be part of the process," said Taylor Sink, president of Zeta Tau Alpha.

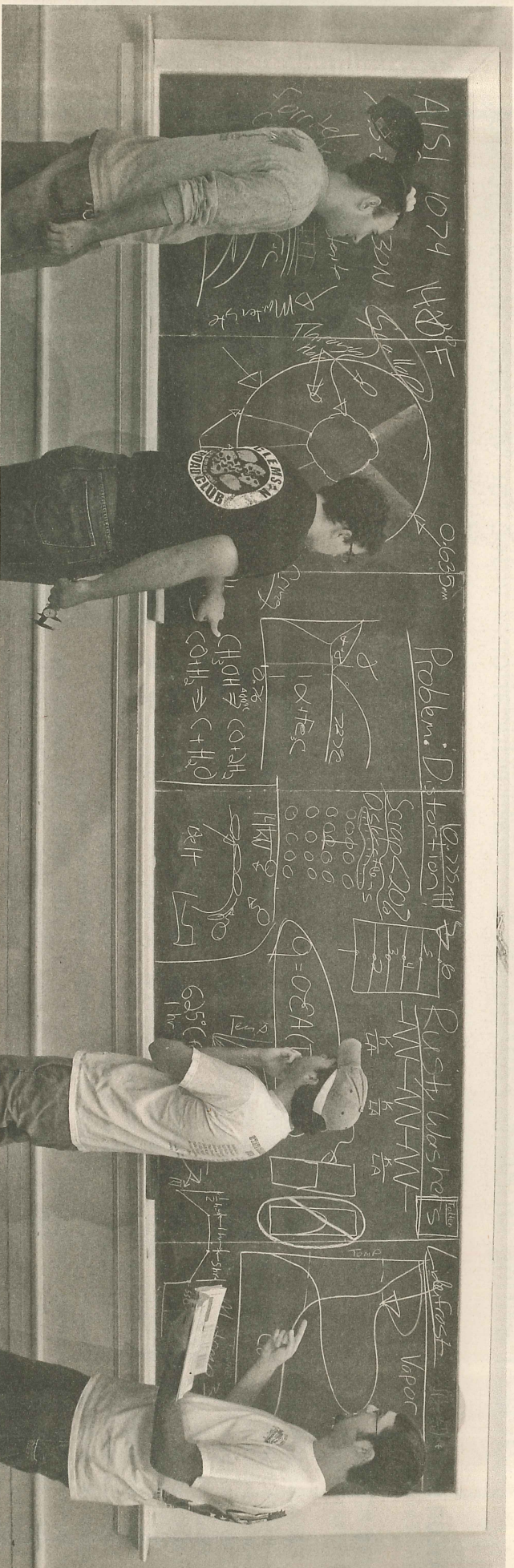

# Hands-on research broadens horizons

Creative inquiry provides innovative learning experience in multiple fields.

Creative inquiry classes at Clemson are providing students with research experience through an in-depth, hands-on approach to learning.

As Clemson continues moving toward its Top 20 goal, creative inquiry projects allow students to step outside of the usual classroom setting and conduct research of their own.

Projects place emphasis on developing communication skills, reasoning and critical thinking skills, ethical judgment and an understanding of different methods of research.

From engineering to theatre and from nursing to political science, each academic department at Clemson offers creative inquiry projects for students

interested in expanding their knowledge and experience in specified areas.

One goal of creative inquiry is gaining real-world experience.

"I was involved in Computer Science 481, which simulated an open-source software development company, where we (the students) were in charge of developing online survey software, along with all of the business-related issues that go along with it," said senior Luke Segars.

"The professors took a somewhat hands-off approach, and it let us apply everything that we learn in standard classes in a fun and interactive way."

Not only do creative inquiry classes provide job experience, but they also allow students to engineer products that could save lives.

"The aim of the Functional Tissue Engineering of Heart Valves creative

inquiry is to use tissue engineering approaches to create and test implantable heart valve replacement," said Jiro Nagatomi, professor of Bioengineering.

"Students can learn and recognize the complex process of scientific research while solving hands-on, open-ended research problems."

Other projects put students in positions to raise awareness and add a personal touch in helping others.

"In Nursing 499, the goal of our project is to increase the awareness of health disparities within minority communities and to provide education regarding nutrition behaviors," said senior Jennifer Poole.

"After the final meeting with patients, my creative inquiry group is now analyzing the data from these tests and from a focus group of participants."

Creative inquiry classes also take students to foreign countries to gain experience outside the classroom.

Members of Anthropology 496, "Project El Purgatorio" allowed students to travel to Peru for an archaeological dig.

"Creative inquiry gave me experience in a third world country, and it taught me to work in teams with people of different nationalities," said senior Toni Boyer.

"Workwise, it got me an internship in Galinburg at the Great Smoky Mountains National Park and an archives job at the Strom Thurmond Center."

Also, the College of Business and Behavioral Science along with the College of Architecture, Arts and Humanities offer a wide range of creative inquiry projects, such as "Teaching from the Bully Pulpit: Religion and the Public

Presidency" and "Ethnic Children Literature and Camp Read-a-Rama."

The Department of Performing Arts is working on a project exploring how Ambroise Vollard transformed the art world as a mentor.

"We hope to provide the University with a play that looks at how commercial art dealers affected the creation of art and how mentorship can be an art in itself," said Director of Theatre Mark Charnay.

"We also hope to look at the making of art from the inside out and to put a play together with music, art and theatre students working alongside those in English and philosophy."

Creative inquiry classes give Clemson students real-world experience inside and outside the classroom as well as opportunities to explore their interests through intensive research and study.

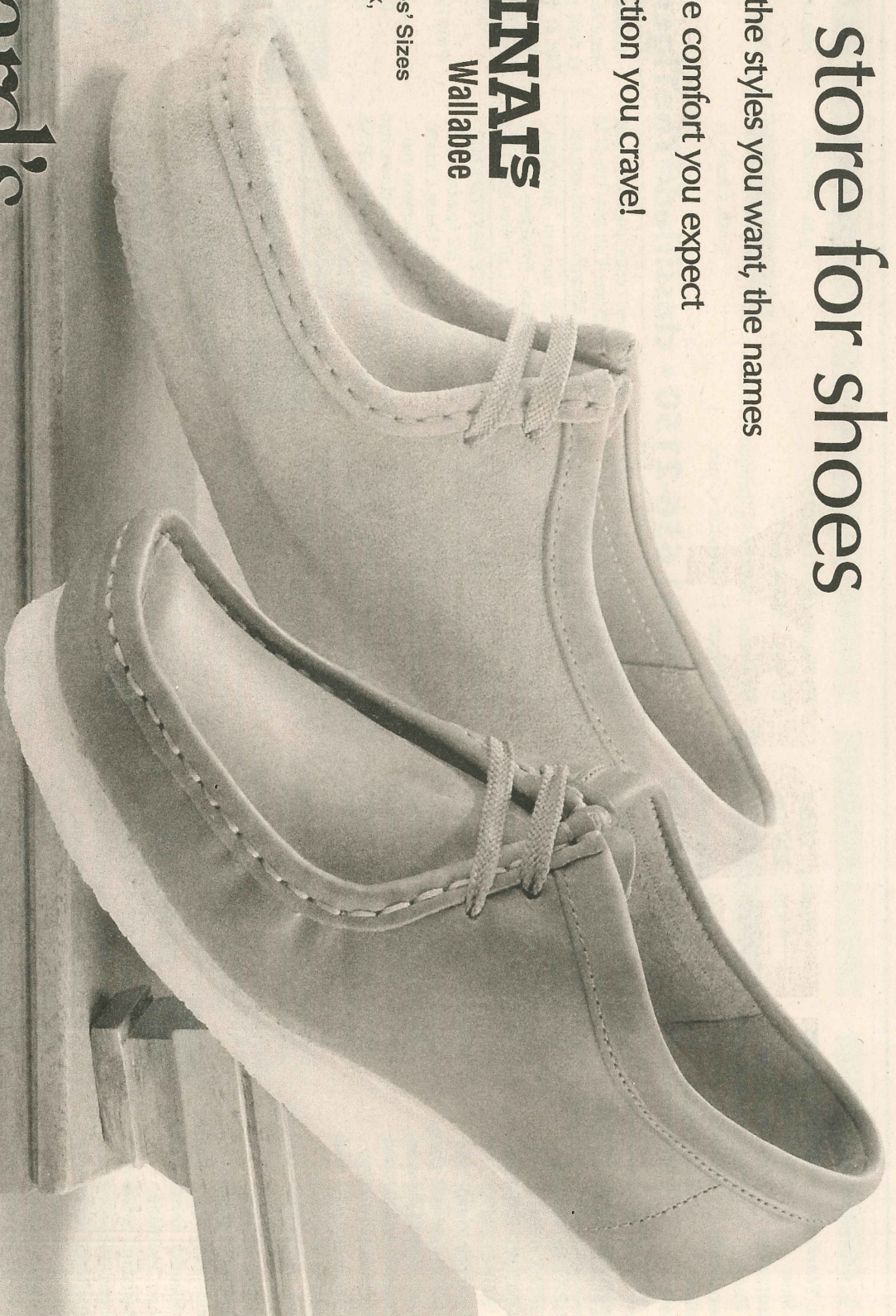

## Barker, can you spare a dime?

An honest take on Clemson's budget cuts and the president's role in them

**I**n times like these where work seems harder to come by or keep, the pay is lower and the hours are fewer, dwelling on how "the other half lives" is practically a matter of reflex.

It's predictably easy to vent our frustrations on people who don't seem affected by our kinds of problems, and, as such, it's also predictable that our venting isn't always as righteous as we might think.

With this in mind, it's only natural to expect some anger when you read about a recent study which found that pay packages for presidents at public universities rose nearly 8 percent this year.

It's only natural to question the sincerity and dedication of a university's president to mitigate the effects of the economic downturn on students, faculty and staff when that president received a publicly funded pay raise.

But let's not be too hasty in our judgments. Our natural responses to news like this aren't always the ones we should stick with.

Usually, whenever we think we have a situation all figured out it means we haven't thought hard enough about it.

So let's think harder about it. The easiest way to do that is to look deeper into the facts of the matter.

Earlier this week, the Chronicle for Higher Education — a newspaper dedicated to colleges and universities — released a study which found that pay packages for presidents at public universities rose an average of 7.6 percent this year.

The Chronicle gathered salary information on university presidents through public records.

According to the report, President James Barker's total

compensation rose from \$411,430 to \$430,438 this fiscal year.

It's important to note that this figure represents both the publicly funded and privately funded portions of his salary among other compensations.

President Barker's publicly funded salary is less than half of the total compensation figure given above, and that portion of his salary rose \$6,200 this year, according to the Chronicle's report.

Still, the question remains: Did President Barker need that pay raise?

What does the raise say about his pledge, found in the Budget Impact section of the President's Office Web page, to "work together as One Clemson" to overcome the financial crisis?

Here's where we need to remember that President Barker received the pay raise before this economic turmoil set in and the budget cuts to the University were announced.

Given Clemson's \$25 million budget cuts in the next fiscal year, it seems that the public portion of his salary will be reduced as well.

If it isn't reduced, then you can probably expect righteous indignation from students, faculty and staff.

Some people have suggested that President Barker's furlough should be longer than those required by other Clemson employees as a gesture of his commitment to solving the budget crisis.

However, this suggestion would do more harm than good.

All Clemson employees who are required to take the furlough are obligated by law to take the same amount of time in unpaid leave.

If President Barker were to increase the duration of his own furlough, he'd be legally required

to increase everyone else's.

As is, the five-day furlough required of Clemson employees is projected to save \$5 million in the next fiscal year, according to a statement from President Barker.

Others feel he should "take one for the team" and put the pay raise back into the University to help alleviate the budget cuts.

This kind of concern seems mostly to suggest that what Clemson needs is a strong symbolic gesture from its president that he's willing to do his part to show us through the budget cuts.

Well, it seems as though he's doing just that.

President Barker recently announced a donation fund for Clemson employees who will be most affected by the coming furloughs, aptly named the One Clemson Furlough Relief Fund.

According to a statement issued by President Barker, the fund is geared toward helping Clemson employees closest to or below the poverty line first and foremost.

All Clemson faculty and staff required to take part in the furlough can apply for relief, and anonymous donations are accepted from students, faculty, staff and alumni.

In a recent video address to the University, President Barker said that donations from himself and his wife Marcia were the first to be put into the fund.

This seems like the kind of symbolic gesture that we should rightly expect out of our University's president.

While we can't know the exact amount of the donation made by President Barker due to the anonymous process for donating, we can at least take comfort in the fact that he has shown commitment to the people who are getting the short end of the stick from the

budget cuts.

Furthermore, a quick glance at the Budget Impact section of the President's Office Web site reveals dozens of suggestions and comments from Clemson students, faculty and staff about ways to tighten the University's belt over the next fiscal year.

Some of those suggestions include the kind of relief fund that's already up and running.

President Barker doesn't seem to be asking for comments and suggestions from us merely as a form of damage control, he seems genuinely interested in this University's welfare.

He seems to rightly understand that making it through these massive budget cuts requires input from people at every level and from every perspective.

So let's not fly off the handle with bitterness at how "the other half lives" in this case.

As it turns out, "the other half" seems just as concerned about getting all of us through this together.

If we hold any indignation against the president for his pay raise, we can keep our eyes fixed on his salary for the next fiscal year to see whether or not we're justified.

At the very least, let's use that kind of bitterness as a springboard for empathy.

After all, there are plenty of people who work on this campus who would consider us "the other half," no matter where we fall on the socio-economic spectrum.

# Will the real conservatives please stand up?

In light of the economic and political turmoil in which America currently finds itself, it's hard to imagine that the solutions to many of the problems we face could come from a windsurfer.

Unlike most windsurfers, this particular one happens to be one of the finest and most popular politicians currently serving in office.

He is a statesman who has earned the respect of his constituents largely because he practices conservatism rather than simply preaching it, and he is none other than South Carolina's Governor Mark Sanford.

The most impressive characteristic that Sanford possesses is his financial common sense.

In response to this lack of fiscal restraint, Sanford brought live pigs to the General Assembly to protest all of the "pork" that passed over his veto.

Lately, Sanford has been the only governor to oppose the federal bailouts of other states.

Not only do large banks with poor business practices get a handout from the government at the expense of the taxpayers, and not only is the federal government considering doing the same thing for Ford, Chrysler and General Motors, but it is also prepared to dole out money to states that exhibited the same types of bad business practices.

In a recent article published by the Wall Street Journal, Sanford explained that the wrong

message will be sent to states if Congress starts handing out money to those that are fiscally irresponsible.

"Those [states] that have been fiscally responsible will pay for or lose out to the big spenders."

"California increased spending 95 percent over the past 10 years (Federal spending went up 71 percent over the same period.)"

To bailout California now seems unfair to fiscally prudent states."

While the federal government is rescuing people from their own bad decisions, Sanford is consistently the voice of reason in a government that is largely out of touch with its constituents.

The main argument against Sanford is generally a misunderstanding of fiscal responsibility.

As expected, his requests to cut money from higher education have not gone over well in Clemson.

However, most who disagree with his policies do not realize that Sanford actually cuts money from everywhere he can, and that higher education should not be exempt from spending money wisely.

Referring to state universities like Clemson and South Carolina, Sanford suggested that "If any institution ultimately feels uncomfortable

with our push toward coordination, they can exit the system and go private."

Unlike the Republicans in the General Assembly and elsewhere in government, Sanford acts on these key principles.

Unfortunately, the State Constitution prohibits anyone from being governor for longer than two terms. (Sanford would most certainly have the popularity to win the gubernatorial election again).

As a true statesman, however, he would more than likely step down voluntarily after two terms even if not required by law.

This means the only way for South Carolina to continue improving as it has under Sanford would be for Sanford to become the President of the United States. It's about time to elect someone to Washington who has a little bit of common sense.

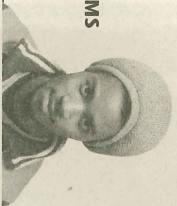

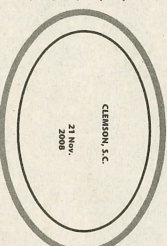
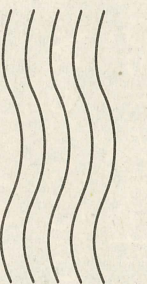
These technologies could be built with readily available materials by students as research projects, giving them hands-on knowledge to carry with them wherever they may end up.

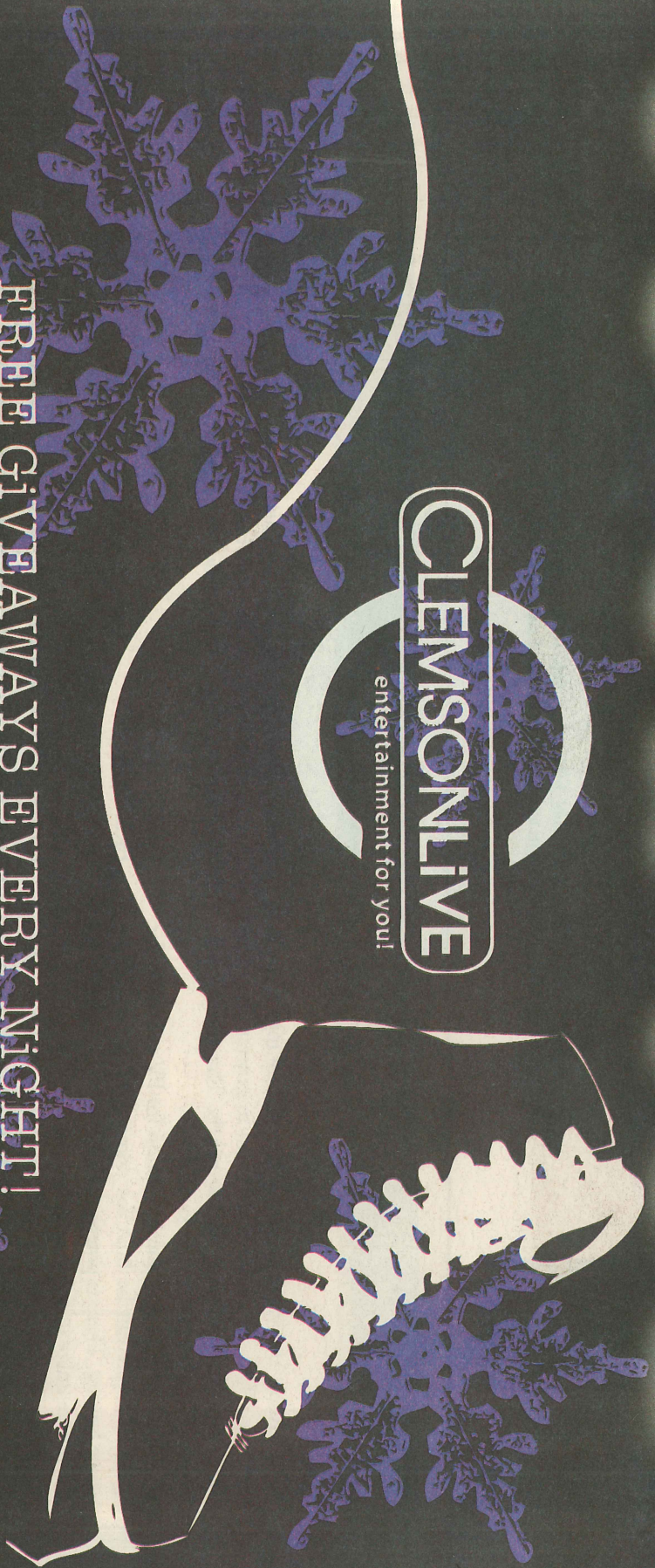

# Clemson clutch in Charleston

Booker named tournament MVP.

The men's basketball team started their "We're not satisfied" campaign last Friday when they competed in the first games of the 2008-2009 season. Two days after signing three major recruits, the Tigers made the trip down I-26 to compete in the Charleston Classic to try to win their third regular season tournament in three years. Clemson opened both the tournament and the season against Hofstra.

The game had some new looks that didn't include the new three-point line. Friday night was the Clemson debut for freshmen Bryan Narcisse, Tanner Smith and Andre Young. It was also the first look of the Tigers without Oliver Purnell's first recruiting class. The game started with Hofstra taking a 3-0 lead, but the Tigers answered right back with a 15-0 run led by Trevor Booker who had seven points including a three-pointer. The run was capped by Terrence Oglesby's back to back three-pointers. The Tigers never looked back.

One improvement was free-throw shooting. Clemson shot 75 percent in the second half hitting 18 of 24. The final score was 98-69 in favor of Clemson. The scoring was spread around with 12 of 14 Tigers adding to the point total including all three freshmen. Booker led the way with a double-double, and Smith looked impressive with 11 points.

The win against Hofstra set up a

second round match with TCU. This game was played sloppily by both sides and was a defensive struggle throughout. Booker once again led the way but this time on defense with 12 rebounds and seven blocked shots. The teams traded the lead frequently during the game, and no team could really gain an advantage. In the second half, the Tigers showed why they are so many expectations this year by pulling away to win 70-58. The win sent Clemson to the tournament final to face Temple.

Temple fought the Tigers the entire 40 minutes. No matter how big of a lead Clemson would have, the Owls would find a way to climb back into the game. Before halftime the Tigers were up by 12, but Temple hit some major outside shots to cut the lead in half as the half closed. During the early stages of the second half, Clemson built up a comfortable lead of 14 and appeared to be pulling away. They maintained it until the final minutes of the game when Temple guard Lavory Allen scored eight points in two minutes to cut the lead down to two.

With only a little under three minutes left in the game, the outcome would be determined by the Tigers Achilles Heel, free throw shooting. Clemson showed however that they had improved once again in the area hitting all the necessary shots from the line to win the game 76-72 and take home the tournament trophy.

# Cross Country finishes strong

Men and women finish 10th at NCAAs.

Both Clemson's cross country seasons came to an end last week-end in Clemmons, N.C., where each ran in the NCAA Southeast Region Championship at Tanglewood Park. Each had a solid outing, as both programs came away with 10th place team finishes. The women's strength behind their finish led within their front-runner strategy, as they were yet again led by sophomore standout Jenna Baker who came away with the highest honor between both teams. Baker crossed the line in 12th place, and came away with All-Region honors, a first for a Lady Tiger since the 1998 season when former Clemson women's cross country runner Beth Ahern ran such a performance. Baker was also an All-ACC performer earlier this season, so the continued success of the Bellevue,

Ohio native is of no surprise. She posted a solid 6K time of 21:27.0 on Saturday, which was an improvement of 20 positions from a year ago, when Baker was 35th at the Southeast Regionals as a freshman.

Following Baker was seasoned veteran Laura Laughlin, who finished in a time of 22:17.1. After Baker came sophomore Joanie Castagno, freshman Kim Ruck and sophomore Stephanie Butto to round out the team's scoring. The Lady Tigers have vastly improved from a year ago under the guidance of Head Coach Gordon Thomson, and their 10th place finish was their highest since 1999 when Clemson finished ninth at their region meet.

The Clemson men's team used a strong pack to lead them to their 10th place finish, led by senior cap-

# Tigers "Spill" over Duke

Kelly breaks ACC Career Receptions record.

Many Clemson fans were reminded of what a blowout looks like after Clemson (5-5, 3-4 in the ACC) thumped Duke (4-6, 1-5 in the ACC) 31-7 on Saturday. The Tiger defense held Duke to just 168 yards of total offense. Quarterback Cullen Harper played a turnover free game for the first time in seven games. The Georgia native also completed an impressive 20 of his 26 passing attempts to total 292 yards in the air. It was the most yards in a game this season for Harper. The Clemson ground attack was also effective with James Davis adding two touchdowns. Davis is now only four short of tying Travis Zachary's school record of 50 career touchdowns.

C.J. Spiller continues to be a focal point for the offense, and he capitalized by having a record-setting Saturday. The junior running back added an 83-yard touchdown catch in the third quarter, which is the longest in school history from a running back.

The reception also gave Spiller 108 receiving yards on the day, which is a single-game record for a Clemson tailback.

Aaron Kelly became the ACC's all-time reception leader after catching his tenth pass of the day and 217th of his career. The senior wideout broke a record set in 1998 by Wake Forest's Desmond Clark

Kelly is now just 129 yards short of breaking Terry Smith's school reception yardage record.

The offensive line took a step in the right direction against the Blue Devils after a setback at Florida State. The unit has struggled to stay

# CLEMSON AT VIRGINIA

The Tigers had a huge success last week with an impressive win against the Duke University Blue Devils at Death Valley. The Tigers (5-5, 3-4 ACC) were able to dominate much of the game and pull away with a 31-7 victory. The victory brought some relief to Clemson fans after the Tigers appeared to have turned the corner against Boston College two weeks ago but then stumbled when they played Florida State the following week.

The Tigers look to their next opponent this weekend as they travel to Charlottesville to face the University of Virginia Cavaliers (5-5, 3-3 ACC). This is a crucial game for Clemson as they still have the opportunity to qualify for a bowl game with a win

this weekend and a win next week against South Carolina to close out the season and notch seven wins, which would make them a strong bowl candidate.

This will be no easy feat for the Tigers as the Cavaliers are in a similar position, fighting for a possible bowl bid. Fortunately, as of late the Cavaliers are on a two-game losing streak. Virginia has had a very strange season when it comes to their victories and their losses.

They were able to beat two ranked teams, Georgia Tech and North Carolina, and defeat an impressive Maryland team that had beaten Clemson earlier in the season. On the other hand, they got stomped by a 4-6 Duke company 31-3 and had a less than impressive home victory against in state University of Richmond, a lowly FCS (Div I-AA) team.

The Cavaliers are led by their potential first-round draft pick, offensive tackle Eugene Monroe, who anchors an offensive line that has not quite come together.

Sophomore quarterback, Marc Verica, has shown promise at times this season after replacing former quarterback, Peter Lalich, who ended up transferring after the second game having been benched for Verica.

Verica has had a tendency to make some rookie mistakes throughout his games, throwing three interceptions in a loss to Wake Forest last weekend. He is also criticized for taking too much time in the pocket as the offensive line has allowed nine sacks since he's been the quarterback.

On paper, Clemson looks more impressive in almost every category. Through 10 games they've outscored the Cavs by nearly 100 points and held other opponents to nearly 50 points less than the Cavs have. Clemson leads in total yards, passing yards, rushing yards and nearly every other worthwhile statistical category.

Yet somehow, no Clemson fan can be completely confident on a win on any given Saturday this year. Clemson has only been able to beat one team with a winning record this year and at times has looked completely confused as to what they are doing on the field.

However, if the Tigers can play the way they did for the first halves against both Boston College and Florida State and how

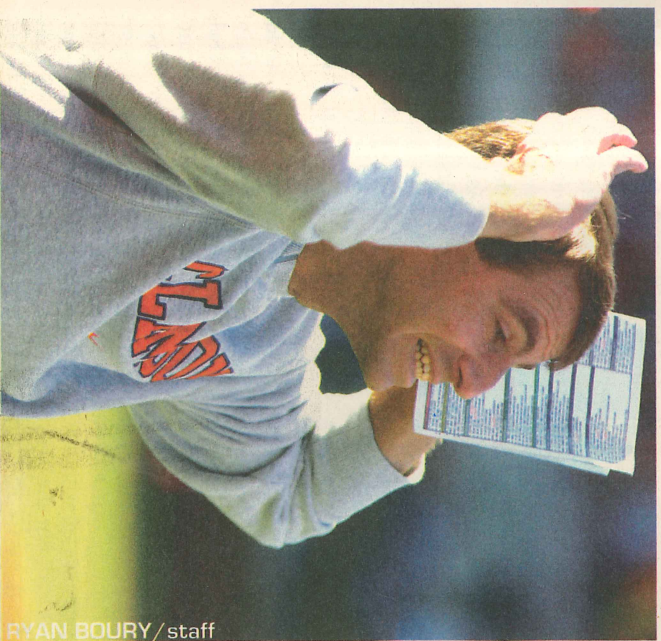
they played against Duke last week, they should have an easy time handling the Cavaliers.

Spiller to have another great game this weekend against Virginia as he really has displayed his ability over the past couple of weeks.

His 83-yard touchdown last week against Duke was the longest reception by a Clemson running back in school history. James Davis also had a spectacular game last week with two rushing touchdowns and looks to carry the momentum on throughout the weekend.

Despite the erratic play of the Tigers over the year, they are too talented to let Virginia get the best of them this weekend. With a potential bowl berth on the line, look for the Tigers to come out early and put points on the board against a weak Virginia defense.

If the Clemson defense can continue their strong play from last week against Duke, then it should be a great game. Watch for the game on Raycom this Saturday at noon.

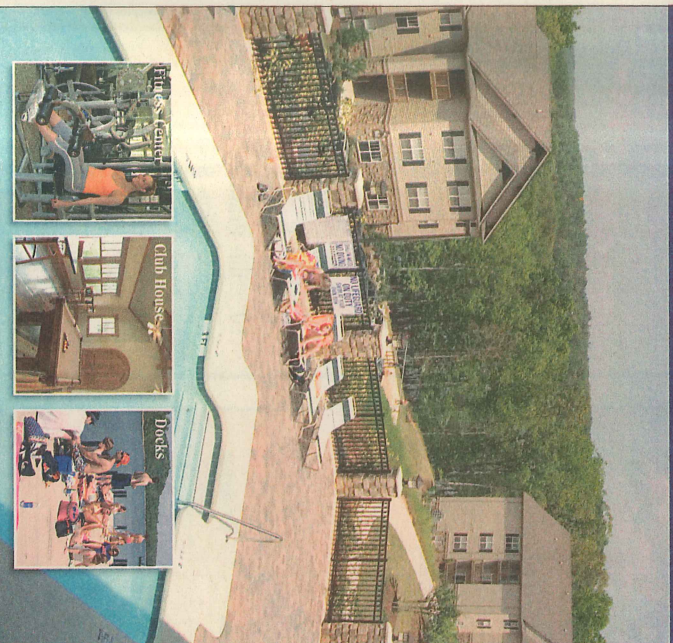

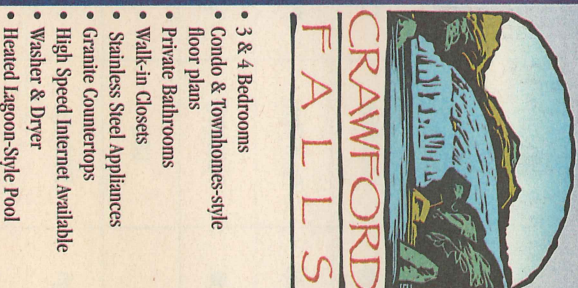

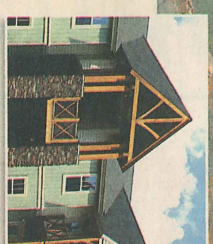

# Healthy Eating: It's all about choices!

Which items to choose...healthy, savory, light, heavy, low carb, low fat? Sometimes lots of options can be great – but lots of options can also lead to poor choices! So when you're choosing items for your salad, here's how to get from the lines to your seat unscathed – limiting your sodium, saturated fats, and sugar.

A salad is a great choice, but some items on the salad bar just don't hold up. Let's start with your lettuce. Pick the dark and colorful greens and skip the iceberg! The more colorful greens will get you more Vitamins A, K, C and fiber, while the iceberg will provide about 10 times less Vitamins A & C (ounce for ounce), some fiber, and water.

Next, load up with colorful veggies, about 1 cup. Pick the carrots, green and red peppers, broccoli, and cherry tomatoes, but skip the cucumbers and celery. Broccoli and peppers are chock full of vitamins, minerals and antioxidants, while the cucumbers and celery are mostly water and aren't as nutrient dense.

Pick the black or kidney beans and chickpeas for your lean protein option, about ½ cup of these. The chickpeas or beans provide a great source of non-fat protein (6-7 g) and are good sources of magnesium, fiber, and folate. Hard boiled eggs are also a good source of protein, but go easy, as the yolks can quickly give you excessive cholesterol.

Skip the creamy dressings! They're tasty, but can be loaded with saturated fat, cholesterol, and calories. Just 2 tablespoons of blue cheese salad dressing can add up to an extra 160 calories! Go with the low fat choices, like the low fat Italian and the low fat Ranch (yes it's low fat!) as they will spare you plenty of calories and none of the flavor.

Discussing what to pick or skip can really help out this time of year, as the holidays are fast approaching. As we wrap things up at work and in class, we'll be spending more time with family and friends, which means lots of wonderful food! So inevitably, we'll be faced with picking or skipping certain foods.



- Keep things in perspective when you are dining with friends and family. Overeating one day won't make or break your eating plan. It takes days and days of overeating to gain weight. If you over-indulge at a holiday meal, put it behind you. Return to your usual eating plan the next day without guilt or despair!
- Avoid consuming a lot of beverages with added calories, such as soda and sweet tea. Replace those sugary beverages with water or other calorie free alternatives, like Crystal Light lemonade or Sprite Zero and save yourself the added sugar and calories.

So, above all, enjoy this special time with friends and family, and remember that a few slip-ups over the holiday season do not spell disaster. Tiger Nation has had little to roar about this season. The drubbing by now No. 1 Alabama in the season opener killed any anticipation for a successful season. Following the devastating loss, Clemson limped through their ACC schedule. The hiring of Dabo Swinney rejuvenated the Tigers enough to gain a rare victory over Boston College, but there remains a gloom in the 2008 season, as they continue to fight for a winning record.

However, dejected Tiger fans do not need to look far to realize our situation could be worse. Just over two hours away in our state capital, one can observe how pitiful a football team can be. These not-so-lovable losers of the college football world are the South Carolina Gamecocks. If Clemson fans ever feel down about their team, just think of those poor South Carolina students. The last time USC undergrads witnessed back-to-back wins over their hated Tigers was

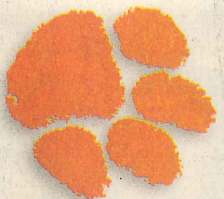
1969 and 1970. Unfortunately, most Americans were too jacked up about the recent moon landing to really notice. Even most home games in the rivalry are heartbreakers for the Gamecocks, as Clemson has won 10 of the last 11 games in Williams-Bryce Stadium. The Battle of the Palmetto State almost never ends well for Carolina students. On the other hand, the Clemson graduates of 1983, 1991, 2000 and 2005 can brag that they never lost to South Carolina in their college careers.

Even outside of the series with Clemson, South Carolina has nothing to hang their hat on. Prior to this season, their all-time record stood at 521-520 — just one game above .500. For a fanbase as large as South Carolina, this winning percentage is pathetic. Among schools that regularly have 80,000 people at home games, South Carolina has the worst record in the country. Not one school with at least 60,000 per game attendance has a losing record; two years ago, USC was the only one. The largest fan bases that have similar all-time records to the Gamecocks are Iowa State and Kansas State. However, their attendance numbers are usually well under 50,000.

What makes Carolina's situation even more pitiful — I can't think of a good reason USC is that bad historically. Our state produces some great high school athletes. The Gamecocks play in the most attractive football conference in the land and have a great gameday atmosphere. Everything on paper says they should be an annual football powerhouse. The problem hasn't even been the coaches.

Over the years, South Carolina has had some of the best coaches in the land — that is, before they lead the Gamecocks. Three USC coaches (Paul Dietzel, Lou Holtz and Steve Spurrier) won national championships before coming to South Carolina. However, this trio of national title holders at USC combined for zero 10-win seasons, one conference championship, and a 6-12 record versus Clemson. Despite making history at other schools, these top-caliber coaches ruined their careers the moment they set foot in Columbia. Thank goodness John Heisman, Bear Bryant and Tom Osborne never coached at South Carolina. College football would be without so much of its lore and pageantry.

When USC adds to their long history of losing to Clemson, I urge Tiger fans to resist the urge to kick the Gamecocks when they are down. When they use names like "rednecks" and "Cow College," they are simply acknowledging our century of dominance by resorting to insults instead of records. Have comfort in the fact that even if Clemson doesn't make a bowl game, at least it didn't take us 102 seasons to win our first one.

# Lady Tigers fall to Furman, rebound against PC

The Clemson Lady Tigers basketball team opened their 2008-2009 season against Furman University last Friday in Greenville. Going into this season, the program returned nine letterwinners and has six newcomers to the team. Clemson fell to the Lady Paladins, 82-68 last week in Furman's Timmons Arena. Clemson was unable to overcome a second half charge by Furman and were 0-1 for the season. Just two days later, the Lady Tigers redeemed themselves with a win to open their home season on Sunday, defeating Presbyterian 66-35 in Littlejohn Coliseum. On Friday, the Lady Tigers were led by leading scorer Lele Hardy, who had 19 points for the night. Teammates Kristen Wright and Whitney Hood also contributed to the Lady Tiger effort, scoring 12 and 11 points, respectively. Down in the first half, Hardy started the 16-point run by Clemson to bring them closer to Furman. Hardy stole a pass from Furman and

made the layup, but was fouled. She converted the free throws to bring the Lady Tigers to only seven points behind the Lady Paladins.

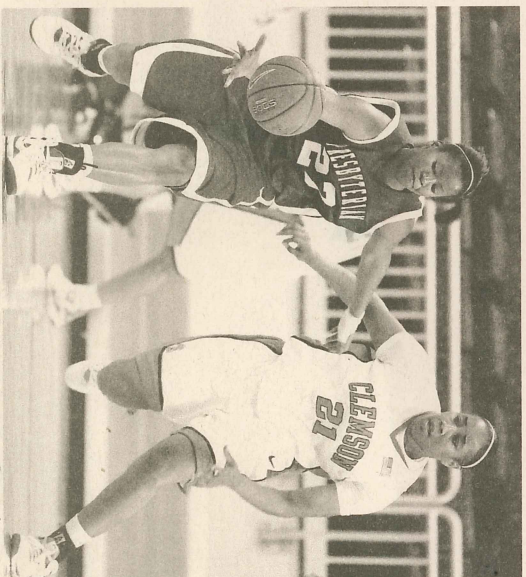
The gap was narrowed even more by efforts on defense with a steal from Wright. She put up two more points to cut Furman's lead to just three points with just over six minutes to go in the game. A technical foul disrupted the flow and the Paladins were able to increase their lead to eleven. The Lady Tigers were unable to catch them.

The Lady Paladins were 80 percent from the free throw line as the Lady Tigers were just 70 percent. In her first appearance, sophomore Jasmine Tate grabbed five offensive rebounds and three defensive rebounds.

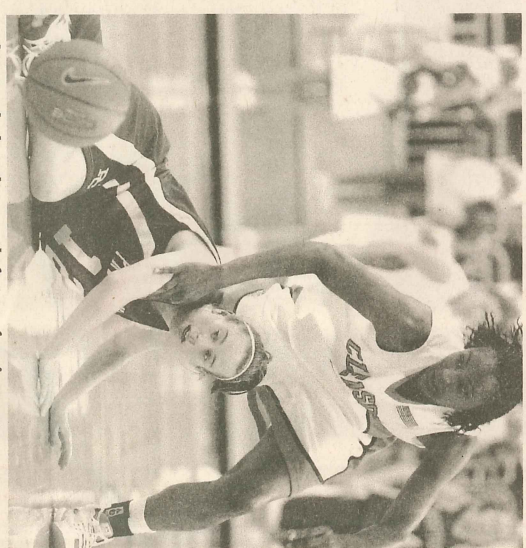
The Lady Tigers looked for redemption on Sunday afternoon as they faced Presbyterian at home in Littlejohn Coliseum. Tate was instrumental in this game, as she scored six points during an 18-3 run at the end of the first half to score in double figures for the first time in her career. Har-

dy was high point scorer for the second game of the season with 13 points.

Clemson did better at the foul line on Sunday with just six fouls the entire game. Rebounds were another area where the team excelled, with 24 defensive rebounds for the game. With 19 steals, Presbyterian was forced to 30 turnovers. Off these turnovers, the Lady Tigers were able to score 33 points compared with just five points for the Lady Blue Devils. Up by five points in the first half, the Lady Tigers came out and increased the lead to 23 points with a layup from Wright. The Lady Blue Devils tried to fight back but were unable to keep hold of the ball. Bryelle Smith was a major contributor to the day's victory with 10 points, five steals and four rebounds. She scored the final points of the game and extended the lead by 31 points. The Lady Tigers will be back in action on Wednesday in Columbia as they take on arch-rival South Carolina. The Lady Gamecocks are coming off a loss against Penn State this past Sunday. The time for tip-off is set at 7 p.m.

Week 11 has come and passed, and with it came some surprises and many lessons learned. For instance, the Dallas offense learned to put points on the board this week with the return of Tony Romo.

The Titans learned they are so good they are going into week 12 undefeated despite Kerry Collins being the best quarterback they have. Just in case you did not fully take it in, when I say Kerry Collins I am talking about the 14-year veteran who has a career 73.7 quarterback rating and has managed only to throw for six more touchdowns than interceptions in the NFL.

The most costly lesson learned came from Roddy White, who realized that he needs to catch passes that go through his hands in the end zone at the end of games. Roddy's miscue cost the Falcons a valuable game in the race for the NFC South.

The funniest lesson, however, came in the Bengals-Eagles matchup when Donovan McNabb learned that ties are possible in the NFL as he marched out onto the field intending to lead his offense to victory while the clock hit zero. Next week, the Eagles franchise intends to reach Donovan what a dropkick is as well as how a play clock works.

## Running Backs:

With Deuce McCallister facing a suspension and Reggie Bush questionable for week 12 and injury prone for the rest of the season, Pierre Thomas may be the best bet for teams in need of a halfback. Despite letting Deuce vulture a touchdown from him against the Chiefs, Thomas managed 144 total yards and a touchdown on Sunday. Even with Bush coming back either

this week or next, Thomas' versatility should pay dividends to fantasy owners brave enough to pick him up. With three of the Saints' six remaining games being against the Falcons, Packers and Lions (22nd, 27th and 32nd worst rushing teams, respectively) Thomas should provide big numbers when your team needs them most.

As Earnest Graham throws in the towel for the season due to knee and ankle injuries, Carnell "Cadillac" Williams enters back onto the Tampa Bay squad after a knee injury suffered midseason 2007. The funny part is that the injury Williams is returning from is the same injury which allowed Graham to become the most talked about fantasy stud at the end of last season. While I do not have as high hopes for Williams this year, I will be so bold as to say that Warrick Dunn is my play of the week for the running backs.

Earnest Graham calling shotgun on the sideline seats for the season leaves Dunn as the premiere back for the Buccaneers. Tampa Bay is heading to the motor city this Sunday to square off against the worst rushing defense in the NFL, giving up 172 yards per game on the ground. Head Coach John Gruden will more than likely be cautious about giving Cadillac Williams too many touches as he eases him back into the game for the rest of the season.

While I am saying Dunn is a better option for this week, I would not count out Williams as a key performer for fantasy teams in the fast approaching playoffs. The guy has yet to take a hit all season, and it's pretty amazing what fresh legs can do for a team. However, if you take away Tampa's week 15 matchup against the Falcons, Dunn and Williams will not play any defenses with poor rushing numbers in a normal fantasy season. But if you are in one of the few fantasy leagues still conducting playoffs in the final week of the season, a healthy Dunn or Williams should have a field day against the Oakland Raiders in front of a packed-out home crowd.

## Quarterbacks:

Shaun Hill is quickly becoming a breakout quarterback late in the season. The eight-year

veteran replaced J.T. O'Sullivan two weeks ago for only the third start of his career after completing 15 of 23 passes for 173 yards while substiting in midgame against the Seahawks in the previous game. The results were mediocre at first, as Hill completed 19 of 40 passes for 217 yards with pairs of touchdowns and interceptions. This past week was a step up as he threw for 213 yards and two touchdowns with half the passing attempts as his first start.

While the new 49ers quarterback has been impressive thus far, he has yet to play a strong defensive team. The three teams he has faced (Seattle, Arizona and St. Louis) are not even in the top 16 NFL passing defenses. San Francisco will be playing against the strong secondary of the Dallas Cowboys' defense this Sunday, so I would not recommend playing Hill.

My recommendation is that teams in need of a quarterback pick up Hill and let him ride the bench as you see how he holds up against a real defense. If you do pick up Shaun Hill, only play him if you are desperate this week because he either going to implode on himself or explode for three touchdowns.

I know I already made fun of him earlier, but if Tyler Thigpen has already been snatched up in your league I would advise picking up Kerry Collins.

He may be old as dirt, but if he keeps playing in Jeff Fisher's conservative game plan without turning over the ball, Collins should put out consistent numbers to help any fantasy team.

While he may only have eight touchdowns to his record this season, his miniscule four interceptions along with his 1755 yards passing add a sense of comfort for fantasy owners who adopt Collins onto their team. With future games against Detroit, Cleveland and Houston, Kerry Collins should be able to put up some big points during fantasy playoffs.

## Wide Receivers:

Tennessee Titans receiver Justin Gage exploded this past week for 147 yards and two touchdowns. Gage has been recovering from

an MCL tear and now appears to be okay after scoring touchdowns in consecutive weeks.

Because opposing defenses already have to play close to the line to stop Chris Johnson and LenDale White, you can expect for Gage to take advantage of the overcompensation and become a consistent deep threat.

Gage will most likely continue to find himself in the end zone in the coming weeks, and a favorable fantasy playoff schedule awaits the fantasy owners who pick him up first.

When you think of the Indianapolis receiving corps, the names that usually pop up tend to be along the lines of Reggie Wayne, Marvin Harrison or Dallas Clark.

But this week, I am expecting big things from Anthony Gonzalez.

Indianapolis squares off this weekend against the San Diego Chargers, who give up more passing yards and touchdowns per game (267 y.p.g. and 17 touchdowns total) than any other team in the NFL.

Gonzalez is still available in 40 percent of leagues, so pick him up quickly if you need another wideout soon because the odds are that when Peyton Manning and company play the worst passing defense in the NFL, everyone on the field will get to score a touchdown at some point.

## Tight Ends:

Vernon Davis has recorded merely two catches in his past couple games. How does that matter in this article?

Both receptions were for touchdowns. So, while Davis has disappointed fans and fantasy buffs alike for most of the season he is at least starting to show signs of life with these two touchdowns in two weeks.

It seems that new quarterback Shaun Hill is starting to see Davis as one of his favorite receivers even though Mike Martz's offenses do not target the tight end often.

I would recommend picking Davis up and waiting to see the outcome of his test against the Cowboys before actually playing him in your league.

tain Sam Bryfczynski who bounced back from a sub par ACC performance, due to injury, to finish 35th overall, in a time of 31:48.8 over the difficult 10,000m course.

Overall, like Bryfczynski, the entire men's team rebounded well after they left the ACC Championships disappointed and dejected with their ninth place finish.

Their 10th place finish marked the eight straight season in which

the program has finished inside the top 10.

William & Mary won the men's competition with 66 points, edging ACC team Virginia by a mere one point in the team race.

Behind Bryfczynski came Jonathan Sunde who finished only eight spots behind in 44th place, with a time of 32:07, easily a personal best 10,000m effort for the Charlotte, N.C. native.

ACC Championship first-best finisher Will Noble finished not too

much farther behind in 64th place, right alongside was sophomore Chris Slate, a native of Wilmington, Del., who finished one spot behind. The final scorer on the afternoon for the Tigers was sophomore Chad Holt, who had a time of 32:56.6.

Both teams will take some much needed rest before they shift towards preparing for track season, in which the athletes will compete in all the distance events ranging from the 800m to the 10,000m.

Clemson escaped the game Saturday without any major injuries which has hurt the Tigers all year.

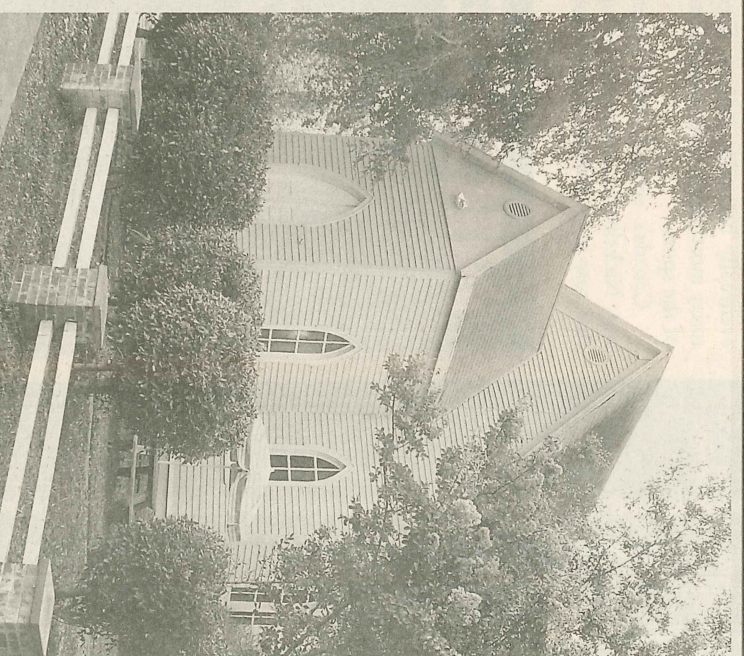
After playing their most complete game of year, Clemson will look to continue its success against Virginia.

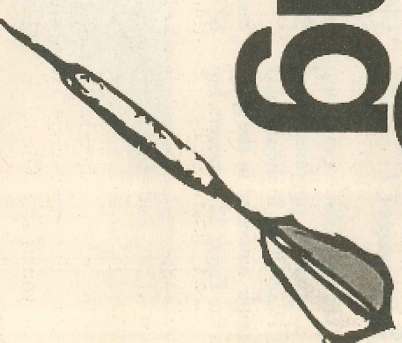

## "Dark Horse" proves nothing

Nickelback's new album keeps Nickelback on free fall.

Once upon a time there existed a northern territory called Canada. In this territory nothing much happened, and nobody did anything of significance. Canada had only two chief exports. The first of these exports was a pointless "sport" called hockey, which, after trying to compete with boxing and mixed martial arts audiences, lost all viewers and quickly fell into obscurity, eventually becoming extinct. Even today most people have never heard of the sport.

Canada's second chief export was Nickelback, a musical group that rose to popularity 8 years ago.

Nickelback claimed to have played music in the rock 'n' roll genre, and for a time this ruse worked. The band managed to sell millions upon millions of records. Each of the band's releases managed to sell more than the last, culminating with "All the Right Reasons," which somehow managed to distribute an appalling 12 million records before President Schwarzenegger banned Nickelback's music in the 52 states in 2016. Nickelback's time posing as a rock band is one of the greatest farces in history; Hitler's anti-Semitic propaganda during the Holocaust, the American "Red Scare" during the time of McCarthyism and Nickelback are all prime examples of what happens when a minority manages to brainwash the masses.

Just as Hitler's and McCarthy's contrived lies and peddled fiction were eventually disproven and their transparency presented to the world, so too were those of Nickelback in the aftermath of "Dark Horse." The album, you see, was simply too bad to pass unnoticed. Each song was nearly entirely the result of polished production by the then-

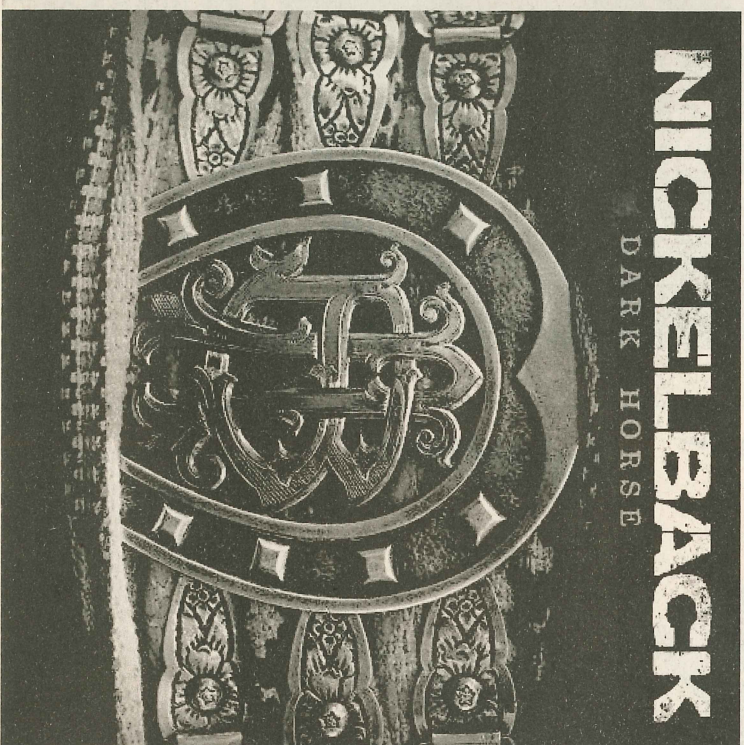
The Astro III opened on Jan. 21, 1971, as a single screen movie house with a red carpet showing of "Tora, Tora, Tora" ("Tiger, Tiger, Tiger" for those of you who don't speak Japanese). It was elegantly decorated, with Greek-themed pillars and fountains in the lobby. Movies were priced at 50 cents. The screening room was divided into three smaller screens in the '80s and after new theaters began opening in the surrounding area, the Astro began showing first- and second-run movies at a discount price. At the time of its closing, the Astro III was serving about 1,000 patrons per week, 2,500 per week in the summer.

Grungy or not, the Astro was the closest theater around with great ticket prices. It was the only way most broke college students could see all the movies they wanted to. Also, those who are under age in this college town find sources of entertainment limited.

The Astro was one of the best places in Clemson to go for some late-night fun, and for students who were car-less, it was indeed a blessing.

## If a Girl Must Telephone a Boy:

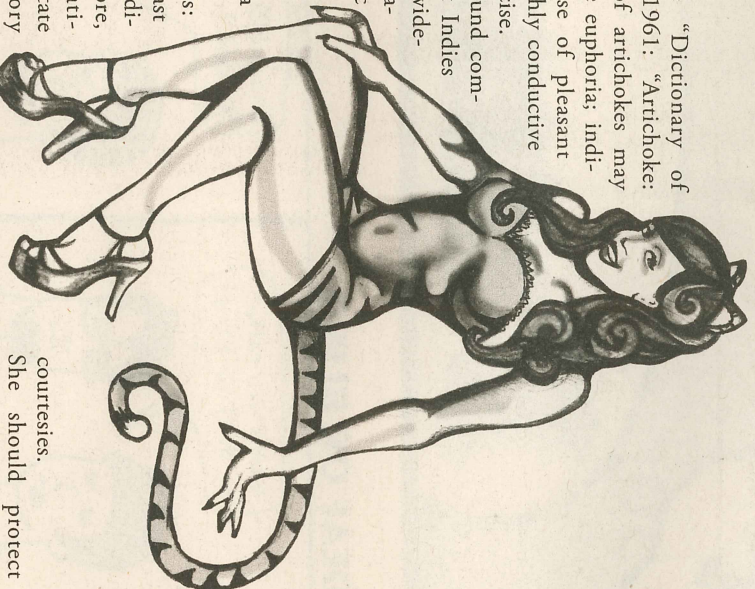
From "Facts of Life and Love for Teen-Agers," 1956: "In a poll of high school boys more than two-thirds said that they do not like to have girls call them on the telephone."

She should protect both the boy and herself from embarrassment by keeping her call short, and not telephoning him too often."

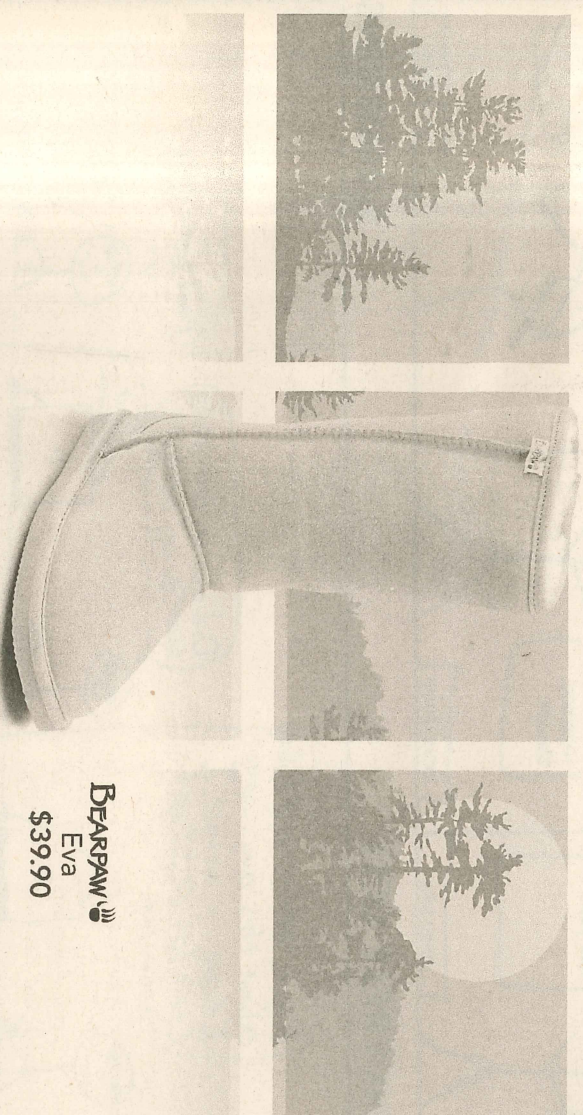

respected Murt Lange (who, after he escaping into self-imposed exile and descending into mania, died less than a decade after the record's release).

But even Lange's efforts could not disguise the fact that the group had no real musical talent, and merely took pieces of other artists to create their music. Additionally, the group prided itself in being able to transcend genres and straddle radically different audiences; Nickelback maintained supremacy over both rock and pop charts and played harder songs for the males and ballads for the females.

This would have continued to work, however, if not for two fatal mistakes. First, Nickelback used essentially the same template for "Dark Horse" as they did for "All the Right Reasons." Each record featured 11 songs of original music, and each interspersed ballads into pseudo-rock tunes at the same intervals.

Each passed off rock as pop and combined elements of what the group thought to be metal and country to give the illusion of originality.

Nickelback's most grievous error occurred with the inclusion of a 12th song on "Dark Horse." Track 12 was a cover of "Saturday Night's Alright for Fighting," originally performed by the revered Sir Elton John.

2 eggs

2 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3/4 cup finely chopped walnuts  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
2 teaspoon sugar

**Directions**  
Combine butter, sugar and eggs. Beat until fluffy. Blend in sour cream. Sift in flour, baking soda and baking powder gradually. Add vanilla. Blend well. Spoon half of the batter into 9-inch bundt pan that has been buttered and floured. Batter will be thick. Sprinkle half of the walnut, cinnamon, sugar mixture over the batter. Spoon in remaining batter and sprinkle remaining walnut, cinnamon, sugar mixture on top. Place in cold oven, then set to 350°F and bake for 55 minutes.

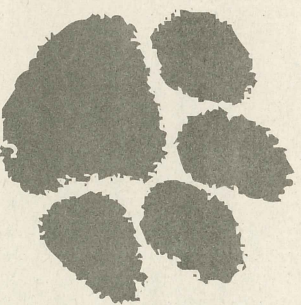

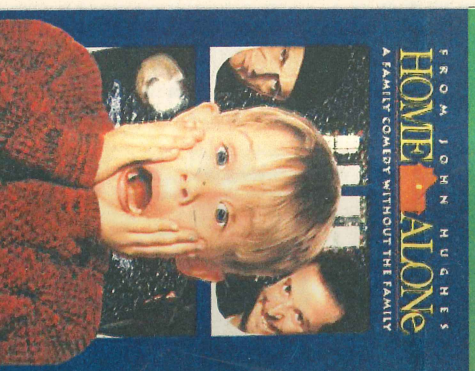
### "It's A Wonderful Life"

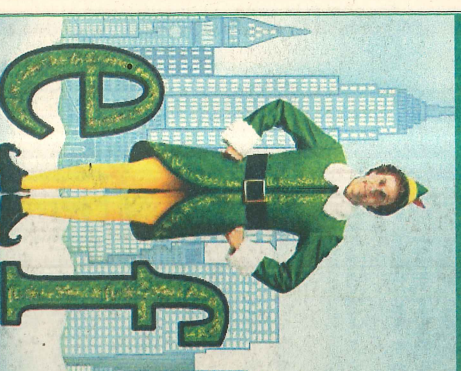
### "The Muppet Christmas Carol"

## 5 Worst Christmas Movies

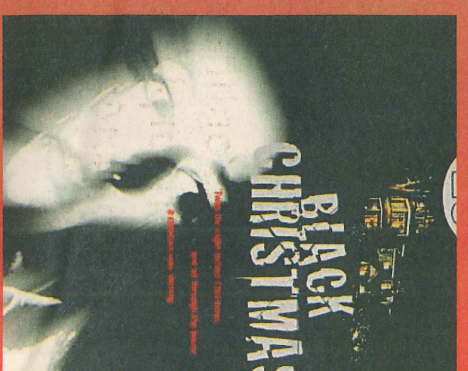
### "Santa Claus Conquers the Martians"
