# Senator's visit sparks tough questions

Students and Clemson community members met for town meeting with Sen. Lindsay Graham.

When U.S. Senator Lindsey Graham took center stage at the Brooks Center on Tuesday, you could sense the tension and curiosity among the anxiety-filled audience. Senator Graham's appearance prompted a unique, but expected, blend of audience members eager to have their concerns addressed by the locally-raised senator. Graham grew up in nearby Central, S.C., where his dad owned a liquor store. "This is home," Graham said. But he made it clear that he was here to answer questions, to not feed us his biography. Sen. Graham opened with brief summaries of the three main points he wanted to cover: health care, national security and our dependence on foreign oil. Graham was quick to establish health care as his number one concern, and the audience's incisive response reassured you why it was. "I am disappointed in the fashion in which health care was handled," Graham said. "The cap and trade system is dead, and both bills are bad for business." The audience jeered, most of it inaudible, some agreed, some didn't. Graham was direct and handled the audience with intricacy, respectfully engaging the audience and addressing their concerns. Moving towards the recent Christmas Day terrorism scare, in discussion over trying Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab as a common criminal, Graham sternly expressed that a huge mistake had been made and that following Abdulmutallab's failed attempt, he should have been immediately

placed in military courts. The audience agreed amicably. Thirdly, Graham addressed our dependence on foreign oil and that he was a proponent of offshore drilling. This met the audience with acceptance.

Following these three topics, Graham quickly began taking questions from the diverse audience. When asked about creating jobs, Graham responded that American manufacturing needs more demand and referenced China as a reason to why we're lacking demand for American the surface and satisfied the audience's curiosity, there was still some contempt within the audience about how realistic such a policy would be. And



while unable to provide concrete explanations to some of the questions asked, Sen. Graham was very open with the audience and addressed audience feedback. Graham made his way through a balanced barrage of questions, briefly answering each question in an equal timely manner.

In a question that seemed to be on a few people's minds, Sen. Graham was asked why he voted for nominee Supreme Court Justice Sotomayor. "Just about every George W. Bush nominee was filibustered by a Democratic

products. "China owns all of our debt," Graham said. "We need to pressure the Chinese to revalue their currency."

China keeps the value of their currency low so that they can manufacture at a lower cost, and enforcing a tariff on Chinese imports would force them to revalue their currency, increasing the value of their currency and increasing the demand for American manufacturing, Graham proposed.

In taking his next question, Graham was asked about tax-code reformation, and striking a chord among the audience, several individuals from the 30 to 40-year-old range felt compelled to shout and demonstrate their disagreements rudely from the rear of the auditorium, demonstrating virtually the same town hall behavior seen late last summer.

In stereotypical fashion, these flustered individuals were removed from their seats and escorted out of the auditorium by men in black suits with ear pieces.

In response to the tax-code question, "If I were king for a day, there would be a flat tax tomorrow," Graham said. While this scratched

minority," Graham said.

He explained further to the audience that to promote bipartisanship, he wasn't going attempt a filibuster unless he had a significant enough reason to, and that despite the controversy among Sotomayor's nomination, he pointed out that she was a qualified candidate for the position. Likewise, the audience applauded Sen. Graham for his bipartisan stance in Congress.

After addressing the top concerns of people who had waited patiently, Sen. Graham began to wrap up his last few questions, and he tailored them among what he believed was most important for America. Graham, while voicing his position on illegal immigration, he made his stance clear that he was not for amnesty and referenced that the 9/11 hijackers came as students, but stayed stateside much longer after their visa had expired. "We need to come up with documentation to make it where it is hard to hire illegal immigrants," Graham said. "Nobody should be allowed to live here legally unless you can hold the weight you bear."

Welborn plans to graduate in May and would like to work on campaigns after she graduates. Her ultimate dream is to run a nonprofit organization in an inner city that meets not only the physical needs of people but also the spiritual ones. She said, "It would be great to work to organize volunteer and outreach ministries at a church that seeks to glorify God by practicing the Gospel." She would also like to teach English in Korea or go back to school for a law degree. She said, "It is so exciting to start to see where we will all be after graduation and what lies ahead after Clemson in this crazy thing called life."

# Med students prevail

Despite survey, CU students still apply to grad programs.

Each year, hundreds of Clemson University students send out applications and prepare for interviews, in hopes of landing a shot at attending the medical school of their choice. And despite recent economic turmoil, as well as looming changes to the country's healthcare system, it seems undergraduates are undeterred about the prospects of medicine and how to finance their schooling.

A recent Kaplan Test Prep and Admissions survey found that only 20 percent of medical school admissions officers report that more applicants declined admissions for financial reasons in 2009 than in 2008. This figure is the lowest among all other post-graduate programs — 28 percent for business schools and 39 percent for law school.

"While med school is more expensive than law school and business school, and definitely more of a time commitment, the vast majority of med school students have been focused on this type of career from high school or even earlier - they've prepared, saved money, know what's involved and are ready to face it," said Dr. Jeff Koetje, director of pre-health programs, Kaplan Test Prep and Admissions. "That said, those who are considering declining admissions because of financial hardship should know that nearly a quarter of medical schools have actually increased financial aid in the past year."

Denny Smith, a Health Professions advisor at Clemson, says he notices that during times of economic decline, the number of medical school applicants

actually tend to go up. "In the late '90's and early 2000's, during the dotcom boom, everyone wanted to go to business school. But over the past couple of years, as the economy has dipped, more people seem to want to get into medicine," Smith said.

The numbers support Smith too. According to Association of the American Medical Colleges, the number of overall undergraduates who applied to medical school has risen almost 9 percent from 2005 to 2009.


Smith, who also teaches a class containing primarily pre-med students, states that most of his students, and the students he advises, also don't seem too deterred or intimidated about the future of medicine, even in midst of large structural changes to the healthcare system.

"We talk in class about issues surrounding the health insurance bill, but the students don't seem bothered or concerned," Smith said. "Healthcare has always been highly valued in our country, so students tend to believe that being a doctor will remain a stable, well-paying career."

Though Smith advises pre-med and pre-dental students, there are other advisors for individuals looking to get into physical therapy, pharmacy and most other post-graduate health schools.

The application process for med school generally begins during the summer in between the junior and senior years for most undergraduates, and may last from a couple weeks to a month to complete. Most medical schools require multiple letters of recommendation and personal statements. Of particular interest to most schools is not only overall GPA and MCAT scores, the standardized entry exam for medical school, but also leadership experiences and community service. However, extensive clinical and laboratory experience is what Smith calls the "unspoken requirement for medical school."

The Association of the American Medical Colleges reports that on average, 43 percent of applicants get accepted into medical school. The average debt due to med school loans is between \$140,00 to \$230,000.

Valdes Espinosa, a 28-year-old newspaper publisher, is the third journalist slain or kidnapped in Mexico within the past two and a half weeks.

Espinosa had just left work when two trucks picked him and two reporters up.

Espinosa was shot five times and was found Friday morning with a note attached.

Espinosa is believed to have been murdered by drug traffickers. Earlier on Dec. 30, Jose Luis Romero, an experienced crime reporter was abducted by similar gunmen in Los Mochis.

Within hours of Romero's disappearance, the lead detective investigating his case was found slain.

Peter Robinson, First Minister of Northern Ireland, to step aside for six weeks in wake of private life scandal.

Enterprise Minister Arlene Foster designated to temporarily fill in for Robinson.

This decision is the result of a fire storm of controversy related to the private life and finances of his wife.

However, Mr. Robinson will not be stepping away from politics completely during this time.

"Throughout this period I will continue to work on the outstanding issues relating to policing and justice and some other matters," he said.

Robinson's conduct will be up for review by the House of Commons and the Northern Ireland Assembly.

Shi Yaping, a 59-year-old Chinese citizen, has been victim of China's clandestine ring of "black jails."

Black jails are unlawful prison facilities that function to deter and discourage petitioners from peacefully protesting the government.

The "black jail" system is no stranger to China, and it is believed that these prison systems began to spring up sometime around 2003.

The Human Rights Watch, an international non-government organization, compiled and released a 51-page report called "An Alleyway in Hell: China's Abusive Black Jails" which cites rape, beatings, intimidation and extortion with prominent use.

Two Georgia teenagers died Saturday after falling through the ice of a frozen pond.

Jacob Bullock, 15, and Marven Mathurin, 14, of Gwinnett County, Ga, died after falling through the ice near the middle of a small pond.

Fifteen-year-old Alex Paul, a third teenager, also fell in but was able to climb out of the water and back onto the ice.

Paul was brought back to shore while divers searched the waters for the two boys, who had been submerged for nearly an hour.

Despite CPR and several other lifesaving techniques, the two teenagers were later pronounced dead at Gwinnett Medical Center in Georgia.

### Power was fully restored after a 6.5magnitude earthquake hit the northern California coast Saturday, leaving many thousands without power.

The earthquake, which registered a 6.5 on the Richter scale, was followed by almost a dozen aftershocks.

It is estimated that around 28,000 Pacific Gas and Electric customers were without power.

Luckily, no reports of serious damage or injury came from the natural disaster.

"We are used to feeling small ones," Chris Durant, a reporter for the Eureka Times-Standard said. "But after the first few seconds, we looked at each other and said, 'this is not a small one."

# No graduate left behind

# Entire December class fulfills ePortfolio requirements.

Clemson University undergraduates can breathe a sigh of relief. At the December graduation ceremony, all undergraduates received their degrees, with none being held back to complete the ePortfolio requirements.

"It went phenomenal, in that, everybody made it," said Dr. Gail Ring, director of the ePortfolio. "Everybody got through, everybody submitted, everybody had artifacts scored...100 percent success."

With the first crop of students under the ePortfolio graduating, there was talk throughout campus of students being detained until the requirements were met.

There was also widespread confusion, and even panic, over who had to complete a portfolio.

Kristin Bridgmon, who graduated in December with a degree in business management, wasn't certain she had to complete a portfolio until her last semester.

She said the ePortfolio would've been easier to complete if the requirements were more relevant to her field of study.

"That would be very beneficial to me, and it would also be like a motivator for me to get it done," she said.

Bridgmon added that the ePortfolio hasn't helped her in finding a job.

"All the jobs that I'm looking for have no relation to any of the requirements for the ePortfolio," she said. "I didn't really see where it benefited me at all."

Ring doesn't know what's causing all the misunderstandings, but

said she heard rumors of professors and advisors telling students not to complete a portfolio. "That fear of the unknown, that fear of getting started, has contributed to their procrastination," she said. "Once they get started, they realize it's not that difficult."

Ring urges students to read the e-mails she sends out regarding the ePortfolio, especially changes made to the system. For example, students who store their work in BlackBoard can keep it there, but still must go to the ePortfolio Web site to tag their work.

"We don't want anybody to have to reinvent the wheel or do their work over again," said Ring. "We don't want to punish people that did the right thing and got started early — it just seems mean."

"However," she adds, "students think that they had a portfolio in BlackBoard and that meant that they had tagged their work to the competencies — they didn't. That's a completely different thing."

Senior Anna Levan is double majoring in psychology and sociology, and is not worried about the requirements. "I haven't really started it yet," she said, "so finding the motivation to start has been my biggest problem."

To receive her degree in psychology, Levan has to take a senior lab class, the purpose of which, she said, "has kind of shifted from being a capstone of psychology to putting together your ePortfolio and getting it ready."

Despite graduation being months away and having yet to begin her portfolio, Levan said she is not concerned, mainly because of the time spent in class on putting the portfolio together, as well as the other help outlets available to students.

Like Bridgmon, Levan thinks there are good intentions behind the ePortfolio, but poor execution, adding that students dislike "not necessarily the concept of the ePortfolio, but the fact that no one really knows what's going on."

Levan would like to see more emphasis on the requirements from freshman year. "Everyone needs to be on the same page," she said, "instead of everyone being confused about who has to do it and who doesn't."

Ring said that in the future, the competencies will be more relevant to a student's course of study, but stressed that she has no control over the curriculum for each major or college. "The faculty control the curriculum," she said. "What Gail Ring does is get 100 percent graduation of students with their portfolios."

Ring said completing the portfolio ahead of time would enable students to get feedback and make necessary adjustments to their artifacts. "If you wait 'till the last minute, you're going to miss out on getting that feedback," she said.

Bridgmon also warns students about the dangers of procrastinating. "Do them as quickly as you can," she said. "This is not what you need to be worrying about during exam week."

Levan agrees. "It would be helpful for students to keep up with their work through all four years of school," she said. "It's easy to forget about it until your last semester of college."

On Tuesday, one of the most popular search engines Google reported that "intellectual property" had been stolen in a series of cyber attacks originating out of China.

This is not the first series of attacks emanating from China in the last few years, but the cyber attacks have becoming increasingly more frequent in the last weeks.

Google is not the only target of these cyber attacks, their investigations have revealed that over 20 other similar companies have been targeted as well.

Further evidence has suggested that these cyber attacks are much too sophisticated to have come from amateur hackers

"These types of operational techniques are not characteristic of amateur hackers operating in widely dispersed geographic areas," a recent study for the U.S.-China economic commission reports.

Many U.S. officials have said that these cyber attacks are originating from the Chinese government.

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# Sexual assault reviewed

SAFER argues for reformed university assault policies.

In years past, students have noticed a lack of information published about what to do concerning sexual violence on U.S. college campuses. As a result, two organizations have joined hand-in-hand to promote the awareness of sexual assault and change universities' policies that may not provide students with prevalent prevention and postassault services.

Students Active for Ending Rape, or SAFER and V-day started the Campus Accountability Project (CAPS) to help prevent these events from occurring and to help students reform their campus's procedures in handling these cases.

The CAPS campaign asks students to enter in their universities' policies into the CAPS Database. After various questions and videos that the student are led through, an analyzed report is gathered and shown to the viewer. With the advantages of the online survey, students can see their school's report as well as trends across the country in sexual violence policies.

"We hope that by going through the

process of analyzing their schools' sexual assault policies, students will see what their administrations are or aren't doing to keep the campus safe and support survivors of sexual violence," said Sarah Martino, communications coordinator for SAFER. "If they find they aren't happy, we're hoping this prompts them to take action and try and make changes!"

While some universities have their work cut out for them, Clemson's policies and programs in place cover many of the criteria SAFER promotes in its database. In the last three years, there is only one report of any type of sexual violence on campus according to the Security and Fire Safety Report. The University's policy offers around-the-clock crises services for anyone, female or male, in need of immediate help as well as free counseling to survivors and the option to report the incident anonymously.

As far as prevention is concerned, Clemson University Police Department (CUPD) offers many educational sessions to help prevent becoming a victim through selfdefense and safety presentations. Clemson also offers the escort service to take faculty, staff and students across campus from 7 p.m.

until 7 a.m.

"We try to work with everyone in the community to promote crime techniques as a whole. We do this by speaking engagements; any persons or groups can request programs on safety tips, there is link on our Web site with links and information and Powerpoints that we will offer and do," said Sergeant Karl Kaylor, CUPD crime prevention officer. "Can be anything from alcohol awareness to safety and self defense."

Emergency phones are also placed around campus to provide another way for students to contact Clemson's Police dispatcher.

Kaylor also recommended putting CUPD's phone number, (864)656-2222 into personal cell phones. Dialing 911 on campus may connect to dispatchers in Pickens County or City of Clemson's police department, which are farther away.

# Tips on staying safe

- 1. Don't carry or store large sums of cash.
- 2. Use campus escort services.
- 3. Avoid unlit areas. Whenever possible, walk and park in well-lit public areas.
- 4. If you drink, drink responsibly and don't leave vour drink unattended.
- 5. Vary your routine. Do not walk the same route night after night.
- 6. When driving, try to always have at least a half tank of gas in your car.
- 7. Do not hold the doors for anvone vou do not know in the residence halls.
- 8. Report suspicious persons to the police immediately.

Then, as quickly as he had begun answering questions, he began to make his conclusion. "If I had one thing to tell you tonight, it is that an Iranian nuclear power would be a mistake." But don't take his word for it, there are hundreds of love-struck testimonials to show you just how happy you could be. You can't get to your computer fast enough.

Dating sites are some of the most exceedingly popular sites on the Web. People seem to flock to the idea of meaningful relationships being only a click away. The reason for such public acclaim? It would seem that Web sites such as "Eharmony.com" and "Match.com" are foolproof. The thorough personality tests that members undergo ensure they will be paired with someone of like interests. But is that the only requirement for a couple to be matched: like interests? While they may be the foundation for a sound relationship, sites such "Beautifulpeople.com" would as answer with a resounding no.

Recently this dating site, which boasts itself as the most attractive of such venues online, booted 5,000 members for gaining weight over the holidays. After receiving complaints from other beautiful members about their apparently curvaceous counterparts, Beautifulpeople.com notified those members, whom

they referred to as "festive fatties," saying that they would be moved back to the "rating stage" of the site where current members rank the attractiveness of would be beauties. A majority of the shunned nonbeauties were not readmitted.

For many, the initial reaction to this tale of modern romantic tragedy is one of shock or even outrage. How can such a superficial Web site actually exist? Are people really that shallow? The answer to the latter question is an obvious "yes." One need not even venture far from Clemson's own campus to know that indeed, the world has its fair share of cursory individuals. But the purpose and popularity of such a site may be more difficult to stamp with "wrong" or "right."

Dating is largely based on initial attractiveness. Whether we want to admit it or not, physical appearance holds some degree of importance when it comes to first impressions. If this weren't true, why would the cosmetics industry be worth billions of dollars and getting richer by the day? the standard and definition of what constitutes a beautiful person differs by individual. Even in the physical arena, preferences vary from person to person. Some people like blonde hair, some brunette. Some people like short, some like tall. Add this to the fact that the term "beauty" may also encompass admirable character traits and authentic personalities, and an actual standard is impossibly reached. Assigning a certain formula for prototypical beauty and putting that formula to work in an exclusive and elite class of beautiful people smacks of a Stepford-like mentality that often doesn't sit well with the masses. It's acceptable to call something beautiful and something ugly, but it seems to be understood that such a judgment is subjective.

Also, the ideals of Beautiful people. com may seem strikingly similar to the preached-against standard of excellence upheld by stick-thin Hollywood starlets whose latest rehab stints grace the covers of tabloids and other reputable journalistic sources such as E! News. The criterion that are force-fed to us by the lifestyles of the rich and famous are hardly genuine, and feed into a culture that has become obsessed with plastic surgery, eating disorders and looking good at all costs. Projects such as Dove's "Campaign for Real Beauty" attempt to abate the negative influence that Hollywood may give to young people because such an influence, such an exclusive and superficial standard of what is beautiful and therefore what is good,

is deemed unhealthy.

So, to the question of whether or not Beautifulpeople.com is a reputable and admirable site based on moral principle, the answer would have to be "no." But, was the site justified in kicking off the unfortunate "fatties" who succumbed to holiday hunger?

In answering this, it's important to remember that these voluptuous victims were former beautiful people. They may seem sympathetic in that they have been discriminated against based on weight, a red-button taboo in American culture, but didn't they, at one time, choose to join the site in search of fellow beautiful people? Didn't they subscribe to the superficial doctrine that their "oppressors" are now turning against them? It appears that they are caught on the wrong end of their own system.

The site, however amorally, advertises itself as a place for people who think that outward appearance is of the utmost importance. To uphold this standard of excellence, it seems that the owners had no choice but to deny membership to "un-beautiful" people. Perhaps after standing dejectedly on the other side, the former site members, turned beautiful people rejects, will think twice before reapplying for beautiful status.



# Worth the wait!

Trevor Booker and the Clemson seniors had never beaten a North Carolina team in their four years at Clemson. He was all smiles following an 83-64 win over the Tar Heels (12-5, 1-1) on Wednesday night as the Tigers ended a 10-game skid to UNC.

The Tigers wasted no time jumping out to a 23-point lead against the No. 13 Tar Heels in the first 10 minutes of the nationally televised matchup in a sold-out and raucous Littlejohn Coliseum. Sloppy play from the Tar Heels and a stingy Clemson defensive effort contributed to a dominant performance for Oliver Purnell's 14-3, 2-1 Tiger team.

Freshman Noel Johnson set the tone early, draining two quick three-pointers to put the Tigers up 14-6 with just over four minutes elapsed time in the first half. Andre Young, Tanner Smith and David Potter followed suit with threes of their own, giving the Tigers a 50-32 lead at the intermission.

But it was the defense that stole the show in the first half. In the first 10 minutes of the game, the Tar Heels had 11 turnovers compared to Clemson's two. Roy Williams' team couldn't seem to get a handle on the ball as the Tar Heels couldn't control the boards or establish a presence inside the paint. Marcus Ginyard and Larry Drew each threw passes into the Clemson student section on several instances. Potter led the Tigers with five steals in the first half alone.

The Tar Heels came out in the second half with a renewed vigor and had chances to make the game close but couldn't convert as Williams, at one point, brought all five starters back to the bench in favor of nearly his entire freshman class. The Tar Heels went on a 7-0 run midway through the second half that cut the Clemson lead to 14, but the Tigers maintained their steady play and put the game out of reach with Demontez Stitt's three-point play with about six minutes left.

Senior forward Trevor Booker, who exchanged "trash-talking" text messages with North Carolina's Deon Thompson, silenced critics who feared the Tar Heels size would be too much to handle for a much smaller Clemson squad. Booker, at 6'7", dominated a sizeable opponent in Thompson, 6'9", all night long. He finished with 21 points and nine rebounds.

Stitt continued his stellar play with a 20-point performance, adding four assists. Smith finished with 14 points while Potter and Jerai Grant each finished with six.

Despite North Carolina's size advantage, the speed and athleticism of Purnell's Tigers was too much to handle. Clemson's full-court pressure forced UNC's big men to run the court much more than they wanted to, effectively wearing down the tired Tar Heels. North Carolina has averaged around 16 turnovers per game so far this season. Wednesday night, the Tar Heels posted 25 turnovers marking the second highest total since Williams' tenure in Chapel Hill. As well as the Tigers ran the court, they shot just as well from the field. Clemson shot 47.5 percent and finished with seven three pointers. North Carolina went 44 percent from the field and only converted on three of 12 three-point attempts. Dexter Strickland was the one bright spot for an otherwise stagnant UNC offense. The freshman guard played just 20 minutes, but led the Tar Heels off the bench with 17 points. Strickland went seven of eight from the field and three steals, three assists and four rebounds. Drew and Will Graves each finished with nine points, while Ginyard and Ed Davis added four apiece. The Tigers, who rank 11th in free-throw shooting in the ACC, posted a season-high 90 percent from the charity stripe on Wednesday

night converting on 18 of 20 attempts from the line.

The loss was North Carolina's most lopsided defeat since losing to Maryland by 40 on Feb. 22, 2003.

Last week, the Tigers dismantled a Boston College team 72-56, backed by one of their most outstanding shooting performances of the season. The week before at Cameron Indoor Stadium in Durham N.C., the Tigers struggled plan, which was to push the tempo and not let them get comfortable, and then do a good job on the backboards."

The latest injustice of NCAA blasphemy is the coaching carousel out West in the form of the USC merrygo-round that has spun itself into a tizzy this past week with Pete Carroll's abrupt departure and Lane Kiffin bolting from Tennesee like the city of Knoxville was on fire.

He calls it "continuing to compete at the highest level of competition." I call it deceit by design. Pete Carroll's sudden, abrupt and left field-like departure from the City of Angels and his mighty USC Trojans dynasty is seen by most as a coach who is simply taking the chance to return to the NFL and pursue his dreams. Some will say, sure it makes sense to take a job with a team in a struggling division such as the NFC West. A team with a high draft pick, solid core players and room for an immediate turn around are all positive factors in the equation of chomp-to-champ NFL turnarounds with the addition of some fresh blood in the front office. In fact, out of all the recent coaching vacancies in the NFL and college, this one might be the most appeasing because of Seattle's great stadium, dedicated fan base and a filthy rich owner who is willing to drop millions at the drop of a dime. Additionally, it's a team that is located only a couple states away from his current residency, but look beyond the surface and you too will see Carrol's resignation at USC and arrival as the future of the Seattle Seahawks is nothing more than a man assuming the role as the Artful Dodger. Authentically simple or quietly complex? You be the judge.

Once the darling of college football, Pete Carroll held the reigns of quite possibly the most successful team of the 2000's since his 2001 arrival. Consider the fact that this past season, where his team finished the season with an Emerald Bowl win over Boston College while suffering devastatingly embarassing losses to Oregon and Stanford during the course of an overall 9-4 record was considered his worst since his first season in which he stepped in as head coach mid-way through the year, finishing his career with a record of 97-19. During his nine-year tenure as Head Trojan, his program has produced seven PAC-10 conference championships, two national championships, two Heisman trophy winners and more than 50 players drafted by NFL teams who are all for the most part doing well. Carroll knows how to breed champions. His players both past and present will carry on the USC tradition that Carroll helped to establish, the brand name he helped to make undisputable, yet there is something that still does not smell right. It is the turmoil and murmurs of NCAA sanctions and accusations that will be what carries the scent of Carroll's memory in Hollywood. There have been more NCAA investigators roaming the streets of Los Angeles in recent months than members of the Crips and Bloods. The NCAA has questions, lots of them that Carroll will no longer be accountable for answering. Did Reggie Bush have a secret back channel of funds flowing into his pockets during his playing days? Joe McKnight was seen driving away from practice in a tricked out Land Rover that he said he never drove, where'd that come from? The NCAA had folded two investigations into one, as the USC men's basketball team is still feeling an OJ Mayo hangover due to his "extracurricular funds and resources." This was done so it can review the entire athletic department's culpability in any possible infractions. That is par for the course in investigations since a failure to monitor can be applied to the entire department. Now, with the depature of Carroll, came a search by USC's AD that seemed more like a last-minute-prom-date-list more so than a true coaching search. Jack Del Rio, Steve Marriuchi and many

Although 10 of those players came into the weekend already committed to suit up in orange for the next four years, that certainly did not make their official visit time any less important. The Clemson swimming and diving teams traveled to Chapel Hill, N.C., on Saturday to face the North Carolina Tar Heels in its first ACC meet of the year. The nationally-ranked Tar Heels defeated both Tiger men's and women's teams. The Clemson men lost 110-181, while the women's team suffered a similar loss of 106-187 North Carolina. The men's team still boasts an overall winning record of 5-2 but an 0-2 ACC record for the season, and the Lady Tigers have a 8-2 record overall and are 2-1 in ACC competition.

Clemson seniors had a solid performance on the day. Thomas Racko not only captured the win the in the 200 backstroke, but also finished second in the 100 back. Fellow senior Katrina Obas finished first in the 200 IM and third in both the 100 and 200 breast.

Sophomore Christ Dart won the 200 IM, placed second the 500 freestyle and took third in the 200 free, while teammate Harry Foster won the 100 fly for the Tigers. Also for Clemson, Seth Broster added a second place finish in the 100 free and third place in the 100 butterfly.

For the Lady Tigers swim team, freshman Meg Anderson finished second in the 50 free and third in the 100 free. Also securing two top five finishes was Maddie Tarantolo, who won second place in the 100 fly and took third in the 50 free.

The Clemson women's diving team almost overcame the top-ranked Tar Heels. Sophomores Brooke George and Cassie Self and freshman Elizabeth Tatum all took top finishes in diving. George placed third on both the one and three-meter boards. Finishing second on the three-meter, Self also took fourth on the one-meter. Tatum finished third on the three and fifth on the one-meter to wrap up the Lady Tiger's top performances.

For the men's diving team, Patrick Chamberlain took fourth place on the both the three and one-meter events.

In the relay races, Clemson won both of the 400 free relays over North Carolina. The women's collaboration of Meg Anderson, Maddie Tarantolo, Heather Savage and Tori Cervone were the winning group of the 400 free relay. 

: What were the major factors that convinced you to opt out of the NFL draft and return for your senior season?

We pretty much stopped it at the Kentucky game because everyone did their job, and that's what we just need to continue to do.

: Who was the toughest player you had to prepare for and compete against in 2009?

: There wasn't really any specific player because we don't just point out players. If you were just to ask what team we had to prepare for the most offensively, I would say Miami because they have so much talent on their offense. Anyone is capable of scoring on you at any time. They've got a great tight end, great receivers, great running backs and their quarterback is elite, too.

: What does winning Clemson's Defen-sive MVP honors mean to you right now  $\mathbf{K}$ and going into your senior season?


"It is a big confidence booster," Booker said. "We were probably a little down after the Duke game, so to come back and win pretty big against this team is a big confidence booster."

After a Miami field goal, it was Clemson's o answer. They moved backwards on two straight plays and faced a long third down, when Ford told Swinney he knew a play that would win the game; he knew he would beat his defender. And he did; Parker connected with Ford for the touchdown, and gave Clemson a huge win on the road; it tied the school record for the highest ranked opponent ever beaten on the road.

The Coastal Carolina game on Halloween proved to be nothing more than a tune up for the rest of the season, as most of the starters sat. But all of Clemson was looking forward to the match up against Florida State the following week.

The Florida State game was another triumphant moment for Swinney and the Tigers, whom appeared to be on a freight train towards the ACC championship game for the first time. After going down 17-6 in the first quarter of game, the Tiger offense and C.J. Spiller took over. Spiller once again broke 300 all-purpose yards.

With the game still in reach in the fourth quarter, outstanding safety Deandre McDaniel intercepted FSU quarterback Christian Ponder deep in FSU's territory. The play sent Tiger fans into a frenzy; fans belted "We Will Rock You" by Queen in unison, and they could see the ACC championship game getting closer every second.

Then the rain started. In one of the strangest Clemson games in recent memory, the Tigers defeated Boston College 25-7 in a contest that was delayed twice for lightning. The defense clamped down and held the Eagles to negative four yards in the first half. The offense was largely unspectacular, and struggled to score in the red zone, leading to six Richard Jackson field goals.

The following week saw even more rain. Top-10 Texas Christian University rolled into Clemson ready for a defense struggle, and the game was exactly that, save for a fluke tipped pass that TCU was able to turn into a score several plays later, and a long pass to Spiller. Both defenses locked down in the rain, though Spiller was able to rush for 112 yards. Parker and the Tigers once again were not able to come from behind at the end of the game, and several missed field goals also helped cost the Tigers a win against a ranked opponent, losing 14-10.

The next week, it didn't rain, but it sure felt like it. Clemson traveled to College Park, Md., to play the Terrapins, who were having their worst season in recent memory. Clemson started strong, but the momentum wore off. The offense could not move the ball; and despite a spectacular shoeless kickoff return for a touchdown by Spiller,

Wins like these are what separated this season from the last few at Clemson. When goals were on the line, the Tigers fought hard and made plays. Swinney hopes to build on this in the future.

The Virginia game was rainy yet again and was also fairly uneventful. The Tigers locked up their trip to Tampa with a win and began to prepare for the South Carolina game the following week.

Clemson was hot going into the Carolina game, having won six straight games. But aside from the opening kickoff return for a touchdown by Spiller, the Tigers never got it going, losing to their rivals 34-17 in a game that was never very close. The Tigers looked like they were looking ahead to the ACC championship game in Tampa against Georgia Tech.

The ACC championship game was the first for Clemson, and it didn't end the way Swinney, Spiller and the Tigers would have hoped. Spiller, however, had a Herculean performance in perhaps the best rushing performance of his career. But the option offense of Georgia Tech proved to be too much for a Clemson defense that struggled with the run late in the season.

In a game that featured no punts, the Tigers lost 39-34 in a heartbreaker that saw Tech score in the final two minutes to take the lead.

With the loss of the championship game and Bobby Bowden's retirement from Florida State, Clemson fell to the Music City Bowl in Nashville where it would match up against Kentucky from the SEC.

Spiller would not be denied his first bowl win in his last game



as a Clemson Tiger, however. The entire Clemson team stepped up, including young running backs Jamie Harper and Andre Ellington giving a lot of hope to the future of the Tigers after Spiller. Clemson powered its way to a 21-13 victory on a freezing night, giving the senior class, and Swinney, their first bowl victory.

The Tigers finished 24th in the final AP poll. Swinney was only one of two first year coaches to finish in the top 25.

Clemson scored more points this season than any other team in its history.

While Spiller was ridiculously not invited to the Heisman trophy ceremony in New York, he was honored as a unanimous first team All-American, and Clemson is retiring his jersey as well as inducting him into the Ring of Honor.

The season did not completely go in Clemson's direction all year, but the groundwork is now laid for Dabo Swinney. The team this season felt more like a cohesive unit; they seemed like they would never give up, and they never did.

Dabo set out to accomplish something in his first season, and he did it. And personally, I can't wait to see what he does next.

Early results from Tiger's Track and Field forecast strong season ahead.

The Clemson Invitational was held this past Friday and Saturday at the Clemson Indoor Track Facility and featured nine teams from across the Southeast. On the first day of the event, the Tigers won eight events and produced four NCAA provisional times.

In the men's 60-meter dash, freshman Warren Fraser tied for first with a time of 6.77 while sophomore Justin Murdock finished in third with a time of 6.81.

In the women's 60-meter dash, freshman Stormy Kendrick placed first with a time of 7.41, which was also good enough for a NCAA provisional time. Kristine Scott, a senior, came in second with a time of 7.54.

There was plenty of controversy in the men's 60-meter hurdles that led to the Clemson runners slowing up due to what they thought was a violation. However, the violation was not called, and the Tigers top performer was freshman Dailyn Moore, who came in third with a time of 8.29.

Freshman Briana Rollins won the women's 60-meter hurdles with a NCAA provisional time of 8.25, which was the second best time in school history. Junior Michaylin Golladay came in second with a time of 8.42. Patricia Mamona, a junior, placed third with a time of 8.64.

In the women's pole vault, senior Caroline Kennedy won the event by clearing 12'5.5".

April Sinkler, a sophomore, won the women's high jump with a jump of 5'9.25".

The men's distance medley relay team brought home first place with a time of 10:25.42. The team consisted of junior Jasen Turnbull, sophomore Bobby Smith, sophomore Chris Slate and junior Tyler Morey.

The women's distance medley team of junior Stephanie Buffo, freshman Karine Farias, sophomore Candace Sapp and sophomore Kim Ruck brought home a victory as well with a time of 12:07.05.

Junior Alex Padgett won the men's shot put with a distance of 55'11.75". Sophomore Stephen White was third with a distance of 49'2.25".

The Tigers won 12 event titles on Saturday, the second day of the Clemson Invitational.

In the men's 500-meter, freshman Jordan Rispress was the runner-up with a time of 1:05.22.

In the women's 500-meter, Rollins, who was named ACC Performer of the Week for Track & Field, claimed her second title of the invitational with a time of 1:14.47, holding off fellow freshman Sonni Austin, who was the runner-up with a time of 1:14.70. Freshman Brittany Pringley was third with a time of 1:17.02.

Fraser claimed his second title of the weekend in the men's 300-meter by posting a time of 34.75. Murdock finished second with a time of 35.33.

With a time of 39.41, Scott was able to win the women's 300-meter. Freshman Jasmine Edgerson was runner-up with a time of 39.80, while Golladay was third with a time of 39.94.

In the men's mile, Morey claimed the title with a time of 4:26.03.

Buffo did the same on the women's side, winning the women's mile with a time of 5:16.04.

Slate brought home the title for the Tigers in the men's 800-meter with a time of 1:54.57. Fellow Tiger Turnbull was the runner-up with a time of 1:54.72.

In the women's 800-meter, Sapp was the runner-up after posting a time of 2:24.91.

In the men's 4x400-meter relay, the Clemson team consisting of freshmen Marcus Maxey, Rispress, La'Mont Jackson and junior Miller Moss came in first place with a time of 3:17.89.

Austin, Farias, Mamona and Pringley combined to win the women's 4x400meter relay by finishing with a time of 3:47.68.

Sophomore Alyssa Kulick took home first place in the women's 3K with a time of 10:09.18.

In the women's long jump, Sinkler brought home her second title of the invitational by posting a jump of 19'4.75". Jasmine Brunson, a freshman, was second with a distance of 18'10".

Padgett won his second event of the weekend by hitting a mark of 59'11" in the 35-pound weight throw. Freshman Brittany Waller was the runner-up in the women's 20-pound weight throw with a throw of 50'3.5".

In the men's high jump, Moss came in second with a jump of 6'2.75". Xavier Tromp, a senior, won the men's pole vault with a mark of 16'4.75".

Clemson track & field athletes won a total of 20 events over the two-day Clemson Invitational.

The Tiger track & field teams return to action on Jan.15 and 16 at the Virginia Tech Invitational in Blacksburg, Va.

f the 21st century demonstrated anything, it's that the future of film will be dictated by money and technology. The trend began taking hold in the late '90s, but by the time '09 came to an end, films like "Transformers" and "The Dark Knight" became status quo in the cinema.

The entire career of writer and director James Cameron, the man behind "Avatar" (and "Titanic"), is based on high-tech films with ninefigure budgets. Avatar demanded a \$300 million budget of its own in order to pioneer Cameron's 3D technology and needed to gross \$700 million just to break even! Used to be, if a film reached a fraction of that sum, studio execs were popping champagne. Now, if movies don't make it to half a billion they're failures.

Lost in the fray of money and technology is the art of film. A common concern voiced during the months of hype leading up to "Avatar's" unveiling was whether the film would be a technological masturbation at the expense of a story. While there is a well-constructed storyline present (with sci-fi, you can get away with just about anything), Cameron has clearly not spent as much time on plot and character as he has the technology.

Look through the history of Hollywood, and it is obvious where Cameron has drawn his ideas; each character, storyline and plot twist are all clichés and stereotypes that have been repeated and recycled for decades.

The binary of good versus evil is the most rudimentary of conflicts, and the musical and visual cues give the viewer no room to decide for himself who and who not to like. And in a film as political as Avatar, these cues become offensive authorial bias.

It may come as a surprise, but yes — politics. Yep, it's pretty clear which eight years were the influence for Avatar. In the not-so-distant future, the Earth has expended all of its natural resources, so the American government has enlisted a team of trigger-happy Marines and enlightened scientists to invade another planet to exploit its resources at the expense of the indigenous people and culture, all under the pretext of offering medicine and education. Sound familiar? Throw in lingo like 'tree-huggers' and 'military meat-heads' (these are actual terms used in the film) and you begin to feel like your skull bashed in with a 2x4 of fanatical liberal propaganda.

To Cameron's credit, the visuals are incredible. He has taken 3D technology and computer-generated effects to a whole new level. However, at what point does technology transcend and ultimately replace — the artistic value of cerebral film?

Is Hollywood really only good for bludgeoning audiences with computergenerated thrills? And with the bloated price tags of these technology-heavy films, Hollywood will always be preoccupied with financial rather than artistic success.

The century's first decade has offered a bleak outlook on the fate of film. Expect more nine-digit budgets, and expect those films to recycle and rehash the characters and stories of all the cliché films that came before them. Expect to keep paying 10 dollars for two hours of computer effects masturbation, and expect to keep left feeling as empty as the artistically hollow movies of modern times.

Hollywood turns to technology for big screen visuals but skimps on film's original story.


when your standards are this high, you often leave the theater disappointed. This is definitely NOT the case with "Avatar."
